he report at the left shows that AAFA continues to manage finances close to the vest. Dues have not been increased for several years. Many of our members are senior citizens who are on modest fixed incomes and have a continual fight with inflation.

Data in this report shows that total dues received more than cover the cost of printing and mailing the quarterly but there are some other costs involved and we are facing some increased costs—the United States Postal Service is expected to increase our postage substantially next year.

A close look at the figures at the left shows that without donations our income would not have met expenses. Donations are critical to our operation. Our census team has completed ten years of it s planned 15 year project. It is reaching a point such that we will soon be publishing a book on the Alfords in the 1850 census. Sales of the book will help cover the cost but we will require some up front money and we do want to be in a position such that we can provide complimentary copies to some of the major institutions that we know will preserve the data for posterity.
