They lived in Omaha for several years before returning to Cape Girardeau, Missouri. After Annie's death William Henry married Hattie Smith 22 Apr 1912. Anna had a brother, Jackson L. Alford born about 1870 and a sister, Emma Alford born before 1870 but who died at age 9. Anna had half brothers William G.M. Alford who married Pauline M. Brune in 1886 and Thomas Alford. There was a half-sister, Betty Alford.

Another date for their marriage is 30 August 1811.

JAM713VA

It is assumed by some, particularly Captain Lodwick H. Alford, first president of the Alford American Family Association, that this James did migrate to North Carolina with the rest of the family and was the father of James Lodwick "Major Tanner" Alford (1749-1820) the subject of another genealogy. He agrees that there is no evidence to support a connection between this James and the James Lodwick Alford in North Carolina.

There is substantial proof that a James

Alford, born about this time, did marry Lucy Bailey as shown, in what was then western Virginia. The fact that the Baileys and Alfords were both in New Kent County, VA, and because of the similarity of names used by James and Lucy, it is SUSPECTED that the James in Goochland and Louisa Counties, VA was the one born in New Kent County in 1713. It is not certain at this time if the James who died in 1782 in Fluvanna County, VA was the subject of this record or his son, James. (6/95)

JOS888GA

In 1910 he was rooming with his future in-laws in Mobile Alabama. The family was enumerated in Tallapoosa County, Alabama in 1920.

JUL799GA03

Apparently Martha Boswell brought at least one child to this marriage. Margaret Boswell, born 1850, who was enumerated with her half-brother Lodwick H. Alford in 1900. Another record says he was buried in Salem, Bullock Co.

LAR849GA03

Parents reported by Lydia Davis. She shows mother as "BARTON" however other records show Thomas married Susan Barden. Based on other family records it is now apparent "Barton" is correct? Marriage data comes from a marriage list and it is only ASSUMED that the same Larkin married all three persons. Lydia Davis does connect him with the first and third marriage. She reports children for this marriage to be: Susan Lee Alford Oct 1882, Jimmie Pearl Jun 1885 and Joseph Dewitt Jul 3, 1888. See census data in record with first wife.

LIT800NC

A three page list of the descendants of Littleberry Alford was published in *AAFA ACTION* Vol IV, No. 2 page 26, September 1991. See it for more information on this family.

Some researchers believe Littleberry was born in Wake County, NC because that was where he was married. It is probably just as likely that he was born in Franklin County, NC. An L. Berry Alford was taxed in Franklin County in 1834 for 254.75 acres and one white poll. So far no similar record has been found in Wake County. Note however that the 1850 Mississippi census shows his children were born in Alabama between 1826 and 1840 though we have been unable to find him in either the 1830 or 1840 Alabama censuses. There was a Littleberry Alford enumerated in the 1840 census of Nash County, North Carolina. He was age 30-40 but the number of children in the family rules them out as the Mississippi family. It might have been this Littleberry who was taxed in 1834 Franklin County. (Note that Nash, Franklin and Wake counties meet at a point not far from where many of our Alfords lived.)

There was also a Littleberry present in Franklin County as late as 1861. This is likely to be the 40 year old farmer, Littleberry Alford, who was enumerated in the Franklin County family of Robert Moore in 1850. A Littleberry married a Elizabeth Moore on 11 March 1834 in Franklin County. He was still in the county in 1860 when he was enumerated as a laborer living with 55 year old Henry Foster and a 28 year old Lucy Burgess. A Littleberry Alford married Emmariah Lewis on 21 November 1863 in Franklin County.

Littleberry, subject of this record, married into and apparently moved with the Butler family. Another close family with which they associated and moved was the Aycock family. We know more about the Butler and Avcock families than Littleberry's family. The Aycocks moved from North Carolina to Alabama between 1820 and 1829. Polly Butler, who married Littleberry, had a brother named Willie Butler, and he married Mary Alford on 6 May 1822. Mary Alford is supposed to be the daughter of Isaac Alford and his first cousin Mary Alford. One of our North Carolina "experts" is looking into the possibility that Littleberry and Mary were also brother and sister.

SHE867IN

His birth date was recorded as Feb 1862 in 1900 but in 1910 and 1920 his age was such that it makes the birth in 1867. From a combination of several census records we have determined that Sherman had a brother, PERRY ALFORD, who was born 1861 in Indiana. Coming from Indiana during this period Sherman and Perry could be from several branches of the family. Hopefully the 1870 census, when extracted, will provide the answers we are seeking.

WIL830KY02

Everything is right for this William or Williamson to be the son of William and Cathy Bast but we are still lacking proof. Folks with the right name were at the right place and the right time but that is all. Treat it accordingly until proven. •

- 12. Look for old letters written by or about Alfords and submit to *AAFA ACTION*.
- 13. Send in a previously unsubmitted Family Group Sheet on which an "Alford" is a parent.
- 14. Write to Gil Alford, Executive Director, and ask him what projects need officers. Volunteer for the one that interests you. We need people to manage the gathering, verifying, cataloging and submission for publication of a variety of records: military, cemetery, etc.
- 15. Go to the county office that records land records in your county. Search the index and extract all the "Alford" entries before 1900. See p. 54 of the December 1991 issue for an example. (Check the Booklist for already published lists—especially southeastern states.)
- 16. Do the same for wills, especially if you live in an area where we know Alfords lived. Make a copy of the complete will and probate records and send to Janice Smith, Wills Project Officer, 1513 Croston Drive, Plano, TX 75075—Internet: 73734.3121@compuserve.com.
- 17. Remember to tell AAFA if you move! (See p. 44 this issue for why this is important.)

- 19. Get on the Internet! Those of us communicating via e-mail get a lot done much faster than the old "snail-mail" way. Much of the material in this issue was sent to me by members via the Internet. (If you have Compuserve, America On Line, or a similar service, you're already there.) You can also do genealogical research on the Net.

In Remembrance of AAFA Members

Willie Marshall Alford 1919 – 1995 AAFA #128

Willie Marshall Alford¹¹ (Nathan Bell¹⁰, Warren Jefferson⁹, Warren Jefferson⁸, Spire Washington⁷, Brittain Washington⁶, Isham⁵, Lodwick⁴, Lodwick³, James², John¹) was born 18 November 1919 in Hinds County, Mississippi. He died at 2:38 P.M. Sunday, 19 February 1995 at the Manatee Memorial Hospital in Bradenton, Manatee County, Florida.

Willie, who often went by his middle name, Marshall, was the son of Nathan Bell Alford and Susie Mae Overby. He married Beatrice Virginia Ponder on 3 December 1945 in Brandon, Rankin County, Mississippi. They had three children: William Marshall Alford born 5 June 1947, Carolyn Diane Alford born 4 August 1950, and David Randall Alford born 10 June 1953.

He was born and raised on a farm near Jackson, Mississippi and spent the first 20 years of his life there. He was attending school in Terry, Mississippi, but he left when he was 17 and worked painting houses. On 29 November 1939, just after his 20th birthday, he joined the U.S. Army and spent the next nine years in service. He served in England, France, and Belgium in late 1944 and

1945, returning to the states in November 1945.

He remained in service and was with the occupation forces in Japan in 1946 and 1947. He returned to the United States and was discharged in July 1948. He completed the mechanics courses at the Armored Forces School, Ft. Knox, Kentucky and the Tank School, Detroit, Michigan, and was a master mechanic and a tractor mechanic.

He served as a master sergeant, the highest enlisted rank possible, with the 3509th Ordnance Medium Automotive Maintenance Company. the 703rd Ordnance Maintenance Company, and with the 8th Army Auto Maintenance School in Japan. He was qualified as a sharpshooter with the US Caliber 30 carbine. He continued his service in the inactive Army reserves and was recalled to active duty in September 1950 when he was sent to Korea. He served in Korea from November 1950 through March 1951. He returned to the states and was discharged again. He was awarded the World War II Victory Medal, the Army of Occupation Medal - Japan, Good Conduct Medal, Bronze Service Star for the Rhineland Campaign, and the Korean Service Medal.

Between his tours of duty with the army Willie worked as a truck driver for the Dunn Construction Company, a road construction company, and he went back to work for them when he returned from Korea. From 1951 to 1967 he held all kinds of jobs in road construction from truck driver to general superintendent and worked in Alabama, Georgia and Florida. In November of 1967 he moved to a new company, General Asphalt, as Vice President of Construction and spent the next 15 years in that job,

spending considerable time traveling for the company.

He was an avid bowler and taught his children to love and enjoy the sport. When serving in the army in Japan he worked as a pin setter at the local G.I. bowling alley. In 1970 he took up golf and played at every opportunity until a bad ankle began to pain too much. He was on the Bay Pines course in Orlando when he had his first heart attack in 1974.

His cousin, Charlotte (Mrs. Wylie) Alford, of Denver, Colorado, introduced Willie to the Alford American Family Association (AAFA) in January 1989. In the short six years that followed many in AAFA became acquainted with Willie. They come to respect, admire and love him for his friendly, cooperative, "can do" spirit.

When he submitted his application for membership, a letter came along with it saying, "I don't know how good I will be as I have dodged administrative work when possible altho I have had to do some in the past. With some help from you and others I will be willing to try to fill the job as "Cemetery Project Officer" for the state of Florida, if there is no one else to take the job." Then a month later in February, he wrote, "If you do not as yet have a Cemetery Project Officer for Mississippi, I would be glad to take both Florida and Mississippi to get things started. I was raised in Mississippi and possibly could get some help in searching some of the cemeteries." In a later February letter: "I am working on some addresses here in Florida and keep trying to send out a few letters trying to reach some new members." Still in February: "I received your letter yesterday and also the "Founding Membership Certificate" which I am proud of. I will as I have time be trying to recruit some new members both here and back in Mississippi.... I will write to several papers here in

Florida and see if I can find some with a genealogical columnist. I have a lot to learn but am willing to help wherever I can."

He served the Alford American Family Association as representative for the State of Florida. He assisted the editor of the quarterly by typing numerous files into computer records and assisted the census team by entering thousands of census records into the computer. He was also the member responsible for maintaining the master computer genealogy files for his main branch of the family. He acquired and provided AAFA records, such as death certificates, for many Mississippi Alfords. He was a close and much loved friend of many association members, and he will be greatly missed.

The following was written by fellow church member, Clifford D. Boyer, and read at the funeral:

THE HOME GOING OF MARSHALL ALFORD

He has kept the faith and fought the good fight
His joy is not complete.
His face reflects the perfect light
That comes from the mercy seat.

He was a builder of roads and character too To this his grandchildren can attest. Many lives, not just a few, Through Marshall all will be blessed.

His smile was sweet, his hand shake the same

They lit up the church Sunday mornings

No one could see the awful pain At times it struck without warning.

In latter times, voices sweet slowly slipped away.

And Jesus' voice came loud and sweet, "It's time to fly away."

H. Harold "Hal" Alford 1929 – 1995 AAFA #226

Hollis Harold "Hal" Alford9 (Hollis Victor⁸, Julius C.⁷, Warren Jackson⁶, Edwin Barksdale⁵, Jacob⁴, Julius³, James², John¹) was b. 2 January 1929 in Pike Co., MS, the son of Hollis Victor and Ethel McMillan Alford. He married Barbara Jo Lewis on 25 February 1960 in Fitzgerald, Ben Hill County, Georgia. They had two children: Victor Harold Alford, AAFA #225, born 11 December 1960, and Hollis Anne Alford born 22 January 1963. Hal died on 7 March 1995 in Altamonte Springs, FL, and is buried at Highland Memory Gardens in Forest City, FL. His obituary follows:

Longwood, Fla.—H. Harold Alford, 66, of Orlando, died of cancer March 7 1995.

Visitation will be from 9 a.m. Friday at Forest City Chapel in Altamonte, Fla., until services there at 11 a.m. Friday.

Mr. Alford was born in Pike County and moved to Central Florida in 1976. He was a member of Calvary Assembly of God Church.

He was a regional estate planning specialist for Southern Farm Bureau for more than 30 years. He was a member of the Central Florida Estate Planning Council and the Central Florida Chapter of American Society of CLY and ChFC. He was a veteran of the Korean War, serving as a captain in the U.S. Air Force. He served in the Air Force Reserves after the war.

He is survived by his wife, Barbara Jo Alford of Longwood; one son and daughter-in-law, Victor and Lora Alford of Altamonte; one daughter and son-in-law, Cissy and Scott Vanlue of Longwood; one sister, Mrs. Leon C. Jones of Richmond, Va.; and two grandchildren.

Hal's parents' family in Pike County, like most in that period, were poor and made their living farming. Hal worked hard on the farm to help the family survive and for a diversion he collected arrowheads from the fields. At age 16, and after finishing the 11th grade, Hal hitchhiked to Mississippi State University, with a cardboard suitcase and \$100. At college he was a chemistry minor and a dairy sciences major. He worked his way through college by doing all kinds of side work but mainly by working in the cafeteria.

Hal was underage for service in World War II. He was a veteran of the Korean War, serving as a captain in the U.S. Air Force and served in the Air Force Reserves after the war. He served in

Alaska doing intelligence work.

When he returned from service he went to work as manager of an ice cream packing plant in Tuscaloosa, Alabama. After that, in the early 1960s, he went to work for Allstate Insurance Company in Georgia. From there he moved to Farm Bureau Insurance and to McComb, Mississippi near his birthplace, and then to Raymond, Mississippi near Jackson. In 1966 he became the Louisiana state sales manager and moved to Baton Rouge. After a few years it was back to Jackson, Mississippi to be state sales manager for that state. While in Louisiana Hal won many awards including a key to the city of Baton Rouge.

Hal moved to Florida in 1976, where he worked for Southern Farm Bureau. He also had some real estate holdings and was quite involved in maintaining occupancy in all of them.

He was always involved in his church and its choir even though he was extremely busy. He tried to attend as many functions as possible and to involve his children in the band and other activities. He was an avid reader—especially his Bible, which family members say has annotations and highlighting on just about every page. He was a member of Calvary Assembly of God Church.

Hal had few outside interests—occasional fishing or hunting—and did not become interested in his family history until after he was introduced to AAFA by his son, Victor, at the 1989 meeting in Houston, TX. Hal and Victor have attended most meetings of the Association. Hal, his wife, Barbara Jo Lewis Alford, son Vic, and sister Dorothy Alford Jones of Richmond, VA—and many in her family—have been very active in AAFA.

Dorothy's daughter, Jean, was the first AAFA North Carolina State representative and coordinated the 1990 Raleigh meeting. Hal's son, Victor, made a presentation on old photographs at the 1992 meeting in Destin, FL.

Hal was elected President of AAFA in Jackson, MS in 1991 but later had to resign because of other pressing commitments. He served on the board of directors from 1991 until his death.

When asked in 1991 if he would consent to be a candidate for AAFA president, he wrote: "As I told you, I need to retire before I take on more jobs. However, for you I'll consent to run (maybe I'll lose this one and make another.) Anyhow, I'll help in whatever way I can." In July 1992 AAFA received a letter in which he wrote: "Due to my travel schedule

GEORGE C. ALFORD

The Alabama Journal, 2 June 1942

Camden, June 2—George C. Alford, 48, died Friday afternoon at his home in Camden. He had been in poor health for some months. Funeral was held at

his home Saturday with the Rev. R.C. Kennedy and the Rev. Roak officiating. Burial followed in Camden Cemetery, with Mathews directing. Survivors are his widow, Mrs. Carrie Fails Alford; one son, Jack Alford, of Frisco City; two daughters; Mrs. Ed Jones and Betty Alford of Camden; his mother, Mrs. Lottie Alford, of Dixon Mills; two sisters, Mrs. Carrie Sue Dalton, of Camden, and Mrs. Elizabeth Green, of Thomasville; two brothers, Lynch Alford of Montgomery, and Julius Alford, of Camden.

AAFA NOTE: George C. Alford was a descendant of William G. Alford, born in January 1826 in South Carolina. The family was a long time Wilcox County resident. George Fail Alford, Jr., who was probably a grandson of George, was or maybe still is the executive director of AL Tombigbee Regional Planning Commisssion. AAFA has heard from two descendants of this branch, but neither are members. The obituary appears to be not 100% correct based on data from the family and the census.

A.B. ALFORD

Montgomery Advertiser, 1 May 1940

A.B. Alford, 72, who resided on the Wetumptka Road, died suddenly at his home yesterday at 4 p.m. Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Margaret Alford; five daughters, Mrs. Idell Wiggins, Mrs. Nitus Alford, and Mrs. J.B. Bozeman, all of Montgomery; Mrs. A.M. Schuman, and Mrs. Joe Fox, both of Bridgeport, Conn.; one son, G.W. Alford, Gate City, Fla.; and several grandchildren. Funeral plans will be announced by White Chapel.

AAFA NOTE: A.B. Alford was actually Obadiah "Tobias" or "Tobe" Alford who married Margaret Barfoot.

We trace this line back to William Alford of early Hancock County, Georgia. This obituary, when reviewed in light of more complete information, shows how misleading obituaries can be. Mrs. Idell Wiggins was Hattie Idella Alford who married Kimmey Wiggins, Mrs. J.B. Bozeman was Gladys Catherine Alford, Mrs. Joe Fox was Ruthie Victoria Alford, Mrs. Nitus Alford was Lillian Knightus Alford who married Walter Herbert Alford, and G.W. Alford was George Washington Alford. AAFA has members who descend from this family.

AAFA NOTE: Allen Alford was the son of Jefferson J. Alford and Nancy Gulledge. Though not a direct ancestor of any AAFA member, he would be a distant cousin of many members since he is traced back to Isham Alford born 1755. Son "Cleve" Alford was probably Lester Cleve—maybe Cleveland.

Alfords in the San Jose Mercury News

Through the wonderful resource of the Apple (Computer) Library and the miracle of networking, I accessed, from my desk at work, the fully indexed computerized text of our local award-winning newspaper, the San Jose Mercury News, for issues from January 1992 through March 1995. Following is a summary of nearly all articles containing "Alford" as a last name. Two had already been published in AAFA ACTION's "Alfords in the News" because I'd spotted them, so they won't be repeated here, and three obituaries will be published in the "Obituaries" column. Most football players were mentioned in more than one article; a representative article was selected.

Many of the articles pertain to out-ofstate subjects. In fact, only two of the Alfords are local. Six appear in national stories, and three are football players!

Mike Alford

Many articles quote or mention police sergeant Mike Alford. An example:

It is a dark Tuesday night. A gentle rain splashes down on the parking lot outside Second Presbyterian Church in Fort Lauderdale, Fla. A small light shines from inside the church.

Ten women, 12 men and two children have ventured out to hear about AIDS programs sponsored by churches and synagogues in South Florida.

They sit in the first four pews of the three-story sanctuary and listen to the Rev. A.B. Alford tell how all 75 members of his South Miami Church of Christ became certified in HIV/ AIDS education....



Janie Adams has helped lead the AIDS support group at First Baptist of Plantation since it was started seven years ago. Not many neighboring churches have followed its lead. For years, First Baptist had the only church-based AIDS support group in Dade and Broward counties. But Adams senses a shift in focus.

"I think there is just now beginning to be a feeling among a lot of churches that AIDS is something they need to look at, because demographically it's becoming not 'Do you know someone with AIDS?' but 'How many people do you know with AIDS?' "

Some conservative congregations are coming around. Leaders of Alford's fundamentalist Church of Christ initially took a dim view of his attempts to address AIDS. "But as the epidemic really hit and members began getting the disease or finding themselves having to counsel people with it and not knowing what to say, other than to quote Scripture, their attitude began to change," the pastor says.

It changed from the "official" position that AIDS is God's punishment "to a recognition now that it is a disease." Soon all 75 members of his South Miami congregation became certified HIV/AIDS educators. They knock on other church doors for permission to talk frankly about AIDS prevention.

"The church is the best way to get a message across in the black community, but we usually have a real battle getting in, because many black churches are very fundamentalist, though that is beginning to change," says Alford.

"We have to be careful not to actually say the word 'condoms,' for instance. So we get around it by saying, 'You need to protect yourselves.' Then we say, 'See me outside in the parking lot for more explicit instructions.'" The parking lot outside Second Presbyterian Church in Fort Lauderdale is empty again just two hours after the beginning of the HIV Pastoral Care Network's recent meeting. The effort to spread the word about AIDS ministries has been expended. One more time....

Barney Alford of Pike County, MS

In January 1994, non-member Jim Huffman of Picayune, MS, sent AAFA a most interesting document that he found in the Mississippi Department of Archives and History in Jackson, while he was doing research on one of his ancestors. He was looking for a particular slave narrative in a series of interviews conducted during the Depression by the Work Projects Administration (WPA). The U.S. government supported writers and historians during the Depression by hiring them to document the narratives of former slaves still living in the 1930s.

Jim checked for the surnames of all of his Mississippi ancestors because many slaves either were given or took the last names of their former owners. He found the narrative of Barney Alford of Pike County, MS, who claimed to have been owned by Edwin Alford, one of Jim's ancestors. (Edwin was the son of Jacob Alford, one of the earliest Alfords to arrive in the Mississippi/Louisiana area.)

Barney Alford was about 84 years old when he was interviewed. Jim wrote, "There are some misstatements of fact in his story—if he was, indeed, the slave of *my* Edwin [Barksdale] Alford. (There may have been another Edwin Alford who lived at the same time as *my* Edwin Alford on State Line Road on the Pike County, MS—Washington Parish, LA line, but I seriously doubt it.)

"Barney states that Marse Edwin rode off to war, but Edwin Alford would have been sixty-eight years old at the start of the Civil War, so Barney is in error here. He further states that Marse Edwin had his father (meaning Jacob Alford) on the plantation at various times, but Jacob Alford would have been long dead by the time Barney was born. Finally, Barney states that his Mistus (Mrs., meaning Martha Patricia

Smith Alford) was alive and waiting for Edwin when he came home from the war, but Martha died in 1861, so Barney is in error here, too."

Jim suggests that rather than there being two Edwin Alfords in the same area, "age and the experiences of other slaves had simply confused him on the issues mentioned above.... The rest of Barney's narrative remains for us to enjoy as an interesting insight into the life of a slave on an Alford plantation before and during the cataclysm of the Civil War."



EDITOR'S NOTE: The narrative was originally written with an attempt to duplicate Barney's dialect. An example from page 2:

"My mammy, Deliah, wus de cook, an' a nudder old woman named 'Lit' lived one corner uf de yard, an' mammy Lit tuk keer uf all de lil'l black chulluns, an' I played 'round her door steps till I wus a big feller. Dey sed I wus mi'ty bad kase I wus always in Mischief."

I found this text difficult to read, difficult to type, and offensive in its implication that the speaker was ignorant. There was no reason, for instance, to transcribe "mighty" as "mi'ty".

Therefore, I asked Susan Wiseheart, who types much material for *AAFA ACTION* courtesy of AAFA #246 Ella Alford, to type the manuscript in standard English.

Serendipitously, Susan took a class in black dialect and knows how to "translate"! She says: I left in things like Marse, childrens, feller, taters, 'lasses, 'bout, shore. I didn't leave "g's" off "ing" endings, though. You could change whip back to whup and do some other things to make it more like the original without the unnecessary spelling changes that make it seem as if he was stupid when instead he was speaking a dialect. I am leaving it as Susan typed it.—Pam Thompson

On page 1, the first page after the title page, it says:

Autobiography of Barney Alford, Pike County, Re-written Mrs. Wm. F. Holmes

Barney Alford, who lives eight miles east of Osyka on what is known as the State Line Road, tells this story:

At the end of the narrative, the interviewer writes:

Barney Alford is an old negro, rather stout, weight about 165 pounds; five feet and eight inches tall; round face and [very] black.... He wears a mustache and that is grey as well as his hair.

He walks with a stick, but seems not to be cripple. Loves to talk about himself and his mind seems clear on things in his early life, but his niece says he can't remember now. When I saw him the second time he seemed more feeble than the first.

His clothing were old but clean.

The Narrative

I will be eighty four years old this coming November, if I live that long. Marse Edwin Alford was my Master, and he had a big plantation right near the Louisiana State line, and his house was on what was called the State Line road. I was born in a little log house right back of the kitchen and not far from the chicken house.

That chicken house was a big house and old Mistress had more than a hundred chicken in there, and the way the roosters would crow 'fore daylight was awful. They would wake everybody for a mile round.

Old Marse Edwin's house was a big house, and made of logs. It was two houses put together with a big open hall and a shed room on both ends of the gallery. After while he covered the side walls with plank. The plank was brung from the Great Eastern Saw Mill, not far from Osyka, and my pappy hauled it with ox-team. That house had no paint on it, but when they put plank on the walls, they cut the logs and put glass windows in that house. They had brick chimneys all the time. The water shelf was on the north end of the front porch and it had a shelf built over it to keep the sun from getting the water hot. Out in front of the house was a big stump with big trees and close by the gate was a riding block for the ladies to get off and on the horses when they went to church.

Old Marse had plenty mules, and goats, and cows, and oxen, and chickens, but only three horses, and he thought more of them horses than he did of all the mules.

My mammy, Deliah, was the cook, and another old woman named Lit lived in one corner of the yard, and mammy Lit took care of all the little black childrens, and I played round her door steps till I was a big feller. They said I was mighty bad cause I was always in mischief.

Old Mistress was the best woman in the world, for she never hit me a lick in her life, and old Marse was good when he was not mad, but when you made him mad he would have you whipped. He believed in making you work, and if you didn't do your work right, he called the overseer and had him to whip, and that big long leather whip would almost cut the hide.

Old Marse saw to it that we all had plenty to eat. Every Saturday he give every family their portion; if there was a big family, they got a heap, and if there was just a few in the family they got little. These rations had to last a week; he give them meal, and meat, taters, grease, 'lasses, and sometimes a little flour and sugar. All the slaves had a garden and tater patch round their houses.

When Saturday would come, the slaves had to get everything in shape for the next coming week; there was washing to do, there was ironing and patching and picking peas to last a week. Oh, the slaves had plenty to eat. Marse give them plenty milk and sometimes a little butter.

When the slaves was mighty busy in the field, they sometimes had to go to the big house for dinner, and if the work was far from home sometimes the dinner was sent to them. Marse Edwin was not stingy 'bout feeding his slaves.

Old Marse give his slaves good clothes and they made them right there at home: when it rained, Old Mistress would call the women to the house, and had them to start the spinning wheels and looms. Some of the thread was dyed with maple bark, and then she had the women to make all kind of fancy cloth, and they made fancy counterpanes. They made jeans to make pants of. Them pants never wore out. I never had any pants till 'bout time the war started. I always wore a long tail shirt, and when that overseer would get under that shirt he got right on to my skin. I'll never forget how he hurt. They all said I was bad.

Marse Edwin had a big man for Overseer, and he whipped every day. I wasn't bad, I was just full of mischief. I just run the chickens off the nest and get the eggs and hide 'em, and turn the cows and calves together so the calves could suck the milk, and hear old Liz. the milk woman, fuss; one day they told me and another boy to watch one of the horses to keep him out of the corn field: well. I tied a bundle of fodder to his tail and was just 'bout to set fire to it when the overseer seed me; well he catched me and then I got a mighty big whipping with his big whip. Most of the time he whipped me with his big hand, but that time he used his whip. He had a post out near the barn where he would tie the grown slaves, and pull their clothes off down to the waist and whip them, and every time he would the slave they would holler "Oh, pray Master, pray—Pray Master pray" and I was scared of that whip.

No nigger could leave that place without a piece of paper with old Marse name on it. That was to keep the patrollers from getting him, but some of the niggers would slip off and go to the next plantation to see other slaves. They always went at night when the white folks was 'sleep, and sometimes the patroller would get them. I never seed the patroller, but I heard them talking 'bout him.

Marse Edwin had his daddy with him a

whole lot of the time. That old man said he was born in North Carolina and come here when the Government was giving away land. There was nothing here but woods at that time. That old man would set out on the gallery and watch the chaps play.

I was born in that little house back of the kitchen, and I lived there till after the surrender. I don't know what year I was born but Mistress told me I was twelve years old when set free. My mammy had seven childrens and I was the first born and the first thing I can remember was helping to tend the other childrens.

Mammy would bring her chaps up to my mammy Lit's house every morning and leave us there while she went with the others to work. Most of her work was in the kitchen but sometimes she had to got to the field.

Old mammy Lit was mighty old and she lived in the corner of the big yard and she cared for all the black childrens while the old folks worked in the field, and the biggest childrens had to help mammy Lit with the little ones. Mammy Lit would spread a quilt on the gallery and put the babies on the floor and we had to keep the chaps from getting off the pallet and rolling off the gallery. Mammy Lit smoked a pipe, and I learned to hide that pipe, and she would slap me for it, then sometimes I would run away and go to the kitchen where my mammy was and mammy Lit would have to come for me and then she would whip me again.

One time they set out onion plants in the big garden, I stole a piece of bread from the kitchen and slipped in the garden and pulled up a lot of them onions and ate them, and when they missed them onions they laid it right onto me and I caught a hard whipping.

One time I got in the plum orchard and ate a lot of green plums and they give me the stomach ache. I thought I was

going to die. Then Marse come down to the house and give me a dose of Castor oil. I come near dying.

You see my mammy was named Deliah, and she was the best cook in the world, and old Mistress knowed it. and she kept her in that kitchen most of the time, 'cepting when she was in field. When big meetings would come, my mammy would stack them cakes up high on the shelf in a big room and one time I slipped in there and pinched off a big piece of cake, and they shore whipped me that time. Another time I got my hand in a jar of jam and couldn't get it out, and my mammy had to get it out for me, and was whipped for that. My mammy being the cook I stole many a piece of cake or something out of the kitchen and she didn't tell on me.

Every day there was a pan of milk poured in a big trough in front of mammy Lit's house, under a shelf, for all of the little black childrens; that milk had bread crumbled in it. Every one of us had a spoon and we would dip into it and see who could get the most. Mammy Lit would hit me over the head and tell me not to be so greedy and eat it all up from the others.

My pappy was named Jourdan, and he work in the field and he drove the ox team to Covington, Louisiana, with a big wagon loaded with cotton, all that four yoke of oxen could pull at a time. He was always gone a week and when he come back the wagon was full of flour, and salt, and sugar, and one time he brung a barrel of mackerel, and I stole some of that and was whipped for it.

Ole Marse would go along, but he rode horseback, but he always brung Mistress fine silk dresses, and fine hats and shoes and everything fine that she wanted.

They said the big war was coming and said the South couldn't be beat, and

men would come to the big house and stand round under the trees and prop their foot up on the roots of the trees and they would stand there and talk 'bout how quick the war would be over.

Some of the slaves would get together at night time and go down by the creek and pray for to be set free. Sometimes other slaves from other plantations would come and join in the praying. I never went down there, for I was asleep at that time.

One day Marse Edwin rode away on one of his fine horses, and Mistress, she cried and cried and said he was going and maybe get killed. Some of the slaves wanted old man Abe to whip the south and some of them was for the south beating, but all of them wanted to be set free. They just didn't want to work under a whip; they all wanted to be free to come and go when they wanted.

Then one day I heard horse feet and I seed the Yankees coming up the big road, and they come right up to the gate and asked my Mistress to give them something to eat. She told them she had nothing; they just laughed and went to the smoke house and busted open the door and took all our meat and sugar and flour and took it with them. Then they took the two fine horses that Marse loved so much, but they bothered nothing in the big house; and my Mistress she cried and cried.

But them Yankees went down to the gin and set fire to it with all the cotton and burnt it up. Some of the slaves went with them Yankees and they took two of old Marse mules and they never come back.

One day ole Marse come home to stay and he looked mighty sad. One day he rung the big bell and had all the darkies to come to the house and told them they was freed. He told them if they would stay with him that year he would contract with them; some of them left right then, and some of them stayed on. My mammy stayed on and I stayed with her, and then ole Marse paid me for some work, but he paid me mighty little.

While the war was going on I had to help shuck corn and they put it in big bags and put the bags on the mules and me and old Tobe had to ride them mules way down in Louisiana to a mill and bring back the meal. We was gone all day.

After the war was over me and mammy stayed on with old Marse for nigh onto five years, and he got so he couldn't pay me for my work and then I went to the Great Eastern saw mill out from Osyka and hired to Mr. Joe Bridewell, and he put me to skinning logs 'fore they went to the saw. He give me a dollar a day, and I shore was happy. I stayed at that mill and work for nigh 'bout four years when the mill burnt down.

When the slaves was set free, they had nothing and old Marse didn't give them anything. All of us had a mighty hard time. Some of the slaves went to stealing but me and mammy stayed with old Marse and we got plenty to eat and while we had to work hard, he paid us a little and when we left there we went with nothing. I went to the saw mill and mammy and pappy went down in Louisiana. It was hard times everywhere they went.

My mammy lived to be 108 years, she got so old she couldn't walk and had to set in a chair all the time, and somebody had to tote her in a chair whenever she went over the house. She come to this country from Kentucky, and Marse Edwin bought her from a man who was taking her to New Orleans for to sell. Marse Edwin got her at Covington, 'fore she got to New Orleans. She died in 1932, and my pappy died 'bout thirty years 'fore that.

I never voted in my life. Way back yonder they told me I could vote but I never tried. I don't want to vote. My time is short on this earth and I want to live right and the white folks know how to run their business and I was not going to get mixed up with it.

I was promised nothing when I was freed, just told I must work if I got any money and soon found out I had to pay for what I got. When we was slaves old Marse fed and clothed us and after that we had to buy what we ate and what clothes we got, and it took hard work to make them. I had to work 'fore I was freed and ever since I was free, but nobody whips me now.

I never owned my home; I done public work, and then sometimes I work on the farm for shares, and the boss got his share and left me nothing. Then I moved on somewhere else.

I was married when I was a mighty young man, to a bright yellow gal, named Josephine Williams, and she made me a good wife. She stayed with me forty one years and had seven childrens. Oh, yes, I had to whip her sometimes, but then we always would get along better after that. I couldn't read nor write and she couldn't, but we sent all our childrens to school, and when they got big enough to help us, they left home and went up north and done forget us. Some of them is dead, and them that is living won't write; that is the way chaps treat their parents this day and time. Learning don't help chaps take care of their parents.

My old woman died 'bout ten years ago and I live with my sister Lindy Brumfield and her daughter, Nora Walker. They is good to me. I is too old to work, 'cepting I try to make a little garden.

The young folks don't know how to work like the old folks. Most these young folks thinks of is good times and

when they get a little money they gamble it off, and want fine clothes all the time. Some of them goes to the pen, but when in slavery time, nobody went to the pen.

I joined the Little Tangipahoa Baptist Church when I was a young feller, and after while they turned me out for stealing, and then they took me back and I went to preaching, and I shore preached the Gospel for a long time; then after 'while the member of that church quit paying me, and then I quit preaching. No use to give the niggers the Gospel free when they just spend all their money for whiskey, and in crap games, and won't pay the parson.

My membership is now with the Osyka Shiloh Baptist Church and Reverend Evans is the Shepherd of the flock and I is going to stay with them people till I pass on. I believe in shouting, and I know when you gets happy in the Lord and you got a right to tell it. I believe in old time religion.

I don't know nothing 'bout Mr.
Lincoln, but Mr. Roosevelt is a mighty
good man to all the poor folks, for they
tell me he is the man who sent us all
the relief, and help us poor niggers to
live. I know Reverend Evans is the
finest of them all. He goes to see the
sick, and he bury the dead and never
get any pay for it, and his members
don't pay him enough to pastor that
church.

Yes, ma'am, I remember some of the songs that the slaves used to sing but I nigh forgot most of them; one of them went like this when they was coming from the field late in the evening—

We is going around — Oh, the last round—

We is going around — The last round—

Ain't you glad we going round the last round

We is going home.

Another song they used sing was—

Step light ladies, the cake is all dough,

Never mind the weather so the wind don't blow—

One song they was singing all the time was—

Run nigger run, the patroller get you

Run nigger run, it is almost day.

I know there is spirits. I is seed them and I done talked to the Lord 'bout them. One time I was coming by the grave yard and I seed a spirit. I seed the eyes shining like the sun. I said to it, "Who that there?" and it said nothing. I said again, "Who that there?" and that time I chunk it with a stick, and then it made like it was coming for me, and then I run and the faster I would run the faster it would run. I looks back and I seed it coming on, and then I run faster and the faster it would run. It looked like a dog but it was as big as a mule. I hollered and I hollered, and when I was near the house I calls Josephine, and she would not come and I kept hollering. After 'while I fell on the doorsteps and kept hollering, and then Josephine opened the door and asked me what was the matter with me, and I kept hollering and couldn't tell her. After 'while she throwed some cold water on me and then I come to myself and told her 'bout the spirit, and she said "Go long, nigger, you just had too much liquor". I tell you I never went by that grave yard again after dark.

I believe that was old Marse spirit, cause that spirit was standing right by his grave. Old Marse used to whip me and he was shore after me that time, cause he knowed I had stole a watermelon. But I quit stealing after that and now I live right.

That watermelon? Oh, I dropped that at the graveyard. ❖

The cemetery is located on a hill just off Central Pike near Mt. Juliet, Wilson Co., TN, on property now owned by Mr. and Mrs. Phil Smart.

The tombstone on the left bears this inscription directly beneath a D.A.R. medallion:

SOPHIA V. ALFORD Born June 5 1789 Died May 19 1875

Above a hand pointing upward on the other tombstone are the words "We will meet again." Below is this inscription:

WILEY ALFORD Born in Wake Co., N.C. June 12, 1783 Died March 2, 1854 (In Remembrance, cont. from p. 12)

and other demands on my time I'm simply unable to devote the time that a president of the Association should be contributing. As usual, Jo is right again—she told me when I accepted that it was loading my wagon beyond my capacity. Thanks a million to all of you. See you all in Destin." Destin was the last time most of us ever saw Hal. In September 1993 Jo wrote to explain Hal's work schedule and other commitments and their reasons for not making the meeting in St. Francisville. She went on to say "...and I certainly look forward to seeing you again in the future, God willing. Perhaps Hal and I can concentrate a little better after he retires in the next year or so and we're not traveling so much otherwise." The last note we received from Hal in August 1994 said, "Sorry to be so long to be in touch believe it or not, this time I have a reasonable excuse. In 1983 I was diagnosed with Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia. The CLL sorta hung around without any problem 'til March of this year. With my immune system weak, I had gall bladder surgery, 2 weeks later lung partially removed. I've since been recuperating slowly but progressively. As of now I don't know that I'll be in Richmond come October, I'm still scheduled for some chemotherapy and I don't know when it will start. I'm told it will last for approximately 6 months. I sincerely hope all goes well with the coming family gathering."

I talked to him briefly while he was in the hospital. He sounded good and gave good reports but letters received from sister Dotty told otherwise. I remember Hal as the person in the AAFA who made me laugh more than anyone else. He had many of us "rolling in the aisles" at the meeting in Houston. From a serious point of view, he did more than any other member to try to promote AAFA's long term financial stability.

On 3 November 1992, Charles "Skeet" Alford won the position of Putnam [FL] County Commissioner. The following articles tracing the election—from Skeet's decision to run through his election—appeared in the *Palatka Daily News* of Palatka, FL, and were sent by Margary Nelson, AAFA # 393.

CAMPAIGN '92: COUNTY COMMISSION DISTRICT 5

Alford: Growth is a concern

In explaining his desire to represent county commission District 5, Skeet Alford talks about his roots.

Having been raised in Putnam County and raising two daughters here, he wants to ensure the county's quality life for residents.

"I just feel concerned that the county is run in a way that we can manage our growth," he said.

Alford feels that growth management is important to ensure the quality of life. He said he looks at areas like St. Augustine and Ocala where industrial areas are mixed with residential areas and does not want Putnam County to develop that way.

Alford described an area in St. Augustine, where a man's home lies in the midst of several shopping centers.

"His quality of life has got worse," he said.

Alford said he sees Putnam County situated between many larger cities and predicted that soon residents will be sprawling from those areas much like Jacksonville sprawled into Orange Park.

The four-laning of U.S. 17 will encourage the sprawl, he said.

"It's coming," he added. The county needs to get a grasp on growth instead of letting it happen uncontrolled.

To do that, Alford said that zoning regulations and the comprehensive plan need to be followed.

It's up to the county commission to enforce it and make sure it's done the right way," he said. "I just like to see the county run in a way that will help it."

"Growth is going to be a major topic in the future," Alford said. "Funding our government is going to be another priority."

Alford wants to keep the government in tune with the growth.

Included in that is roads.

"Roads are a big factor in Putnam County," Alford said.

To improve the roads, Alford said he wants to look at all the

alternatives.

"I think the MSBUs are a very viable alternative right now," he said.

But, he wants to ensure that the majority of residents in the MSBU area support it.

If there are some residents who cannot legitimately afford the assessments, but the majority of residents in the area support it, Alford said he would like to see the county work with the poor residents.

Another problem he hopes to solve for the county is ensuring the tax base can support government.

Alford said that as situations arise, he will make decisions keeping the tax base factor in the forefront.

Alford choice in District 5

Charles "Skeet" Alford has made it through two elections and faces a third on Nov. 3. He is the Democratic candidate in county commission District 5.

On Nov. 3 he is opposed by Republican Robert Morrison of Interlachen, who got into the race, he said, to return power to the people.

District 5 starts at Alabama Avenue in Palatka and sweeps west along Hwy. 20 into Interlachen. The seat is open because commissioner John Thompson chose not to run for re-election....

Alford took all of the precincts in the west Putnam County district, defeating Republican Robert Morrison, 3,657 votes to 1,093 votes.

Alford received 77 percent of the vote.

"I feel pretty good," Alford said. "It's been a long time since July 4 when we started."

Alford defeated Kenny Morris in the Democratic runoff election Oct. 1 by taking 61.5 percent of the vote. Alford took 40.9 percent in the Sept. 1 primary against three opponents. He will take office Nov. 17

The county position, which pays more than \$24,000 a year, was left open when Commissioner John Thompson chose not to run for reelection. District 5 starts at Alabama Avenue in Palatka and sweeps west along Hwy. 20 toward Interlachen.

Alford attributed his success to contact with many west Putnam County residents.

"We just got out there and campaigned," he said.

By talking with the residents, Alford said he learned "volumes."

"We talked about roads a lot," he said. "I talked about maintaining our tax base."

With the failure of the sales tax,

Alford said that one of his first tasks as commissioner will be to find new sources of revenue.

"This is one opportunity that has gone by," Alford said of the tax. "It's still a problem we still have to deal with."

But for now, he said he wants to learn how the county functions.

He has no hidden agendas, he said. He wants to try to represent west Putnam the best he can, Alford added.

"I'm looking forward to serving," he said....❖

Though there are other Alford families in the county in 1900, none appear to be related. In 1910 they have added to the family ROBERT M. ALFORD 9 and MAGNA ALFORD 6.

Is James the brother of ISAAC H. ALFORD, born September 1864 in Alabama as listed in the 1900 Census of Grayson County, Texas?

ISAAC H. ALFRED Sept 1864 AL LULU ALFRED Aug 1876 TX CECIL ALFRED June 1897 TX EMUEL ALFRED March 1899 TX

There was no other Alford family in Grayson County. Families in Grayson County in 1910 appear to have no relation to the 1900 family.

An Isaac and James are also listed in the 1880 Census of DeKalb County, AL, as sons of HENRY ALFORD:

Isaac's birth year would be 1864—as stated on the 1900 Census—if the census was taken before his birthday in September. However, James' birth year would be 1875, not 1873 as

stated in the 1900 and 1910 censuses.

Although this family would surely have been in Alabama at the time of the 1870 census we have been unable to find them there in the raw census data available.

Henry was born 1836 in Alabama, the son of ELIZABETH ALFORD born 1814 and listed in the 1850 census of Cherokee County, AL, as follows:

WILLIAM A. ALFORD

23 Dec 1844 TN - 6 Oct 1928

I'm currently looking for some information about an ancestor on the maternal side of my family: William A. Alford, was born 23 December 1844 in Monroe County, TN and died 6 October 1928. He served in the Civil War, fighting for the Confederate Army.

He married (1) Mary Ann ____, who died in September 1885. His second

wife, Amanda George, was born 2 January 1863 and died 26 December 1957. We're not sure where the family came from before TN because most of eastern TN was Indian land in the early 1800's. The original home built by William Alford is still standing and inhabited in Meigs County, TN next to the Hiwassee River, a tributary of the Tennessee.

AAFA Notes

William Anderson Alford was Zeno's great-great-grandfather. He thought that William's parents were Mace Alford and Polly Wright, but we could not verify the existence of a Mace Alford.

Amanda George was the daughter of John Alvin George, born 1830 in McMinn Co. TN, and Mary Ann Womack. Some of the following was provided Zeno earlier but there was no feedback to accept or reject the data as pertinent to his family. The following notes are based on AAFA census records which in most cases have not been verified by the AAFA census team, and even then we know they are only as good as recorded by the enumerator.

In the 1900 Tennessee Census we find William A. Alford born Dec 1841 and his wife Amanda born January 1863 with daughter Viola M. Alford born August 1888. The family was also there in 1910, but the microfilm record reviewed was really too poor to report on. In the 1880 Tennessee Census soundex of Meigs County there was a William Alford 39 and wife Mary A. 43 with children Mary L. 12, Frances 11, Dellray 7, and Carla D. 5. There was also a Jacob Lillard 19 SS [stepson] indicating that Mary A. had first married a Lillard. There were no other Alfords in the soundex listing

for Meigs County. We don't have the 1870 Tennessee data yet but the 1870 Index does not list a William A. Alford or any Alford in Meigs, Monroe or McMinn Counties. In 1860 we find no Alford in Meigs, Monroe or McMinn Counties and we find no likely William in any of the eastern counties of Tennessee. In 1850 there were two Alford families in Meigs County and one had a six year old William who can be connected to an "established" AAFA branch. They were mentioned to Zeno before but he did not respond to them. John Alford 37 TN and Hanah 24 TN had sons Robert 9, William 6 and Plesent 1. This would be the John M. Alford who married (1) Lucinda Cardell and (2) Hannah Hollmon and had Robert b. 1841, William 1844, Pleasant 1849, Jeremiah 1852, Sarah 1853, Matthew 1854, Charles 1856, Thomas 1858, Owen 1860, Susannah 1864, Mary 1868 and John 1879. There is just one problem here. This William apparently married Elizabeth Jane Bray and moved to Missouri. In 1850 there were no Alfords listed in Monroe County. There were Alfords in adjoining Blount County (see AAFA ACTION, Spring 1994, pages 55-56.) There were none in adjoining McMinn County but in adjoining Roane County there was one family: Charles 61 NC and Mary 55 TN with daughter Sarah 13. Elsewhere in 1850 Tennessee we find a seven year old William in Maury County, a six year old William P. in Lawrence County, and a five year old William Alfred in Hamilton County. There was a William Alford who married Jane Riddle December 18, 1840 in Monroe County, but he later moved to Illinois and has been connected to an "established" AAFA branch.

Kenneth is looking for more information on his father and is searching for the identity of his Alford grandparents.

MILACE HARDESTY ALFORD was born 29 July 1895 in Avery, Red River County, Texas.

Milace Alford was inducted into the 455th Squadron Aviation Section, Signal Corps, United States Army on 19 February 1918 in Holdenville, Hughes County, Oklahoma, and he was discharged for demobilization on 28 January 1919.

On 9 April 1930 he obtained a discharge certificate issued in lieu of one lost or destroyed. When efforts were made by his son, Kenneth, to obtain a copy of his military records, it was discovered they were destroyed in the 1973 fire in St. Louis.

Milace married Georgia Wolfe on 28 January 1935. Since Milace was 40 years old at this time and Georgia was only 26, it is thought that she was probably his second wife.

When Kenneth was born in 1937 the family lived at 503 Buff Street, FortWorth, TX.

An Oklahoma drivers license issued 11 July 1942 indicated Milace was 5' 9.5" tall and weighed 170 pounds.

Funeral records show that Milace H. Alford died 30 July 1946, age 51 years, in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, and that he was buried in Mustang,

Oklahoma. Oklahoma reports they have no death record on file.

In most recent developments Kenneth reported: "There is a Malice Alford listed in the 1920 Texas census, which could have easily been Milace. He is shown in Witchita County, which is Witchita Falls in northern Texas. The age is right (24), but his wife is shown as Jennie, born in Indiana. My mother's name is Georgia (married in 1935). The parents of Malice were born in Tennessee (no names listed). This may be way off base, but there is a Rachel W. Alford listed with the Thomas J. Mauldin family in 1920. Her age is 13, and is the granddaughter of Mauldin. This would make my grandmother's maiden name Mauldin. Also, there are two sisters listed with Rachel: Ona Alford and Bertha Alford. The Mauldin family was listed in Jack County, which is just north of Fort Worth."

Following up on Kenneth's findings: Other than the 1930 death of a J.B. Alford in Wichita County, TX, we have found little Alford presence in that county. Maybe readers know of others. The fact that the Milace Alford in Wichita County in 1920 had a wife named Jennie should not exclude him as a possibility. Since he married Kenneth's mother when he was age 40 it is very likely that he did have a previous marriage as suggested earlier. The place of birth of this first wife should not be significant at all in this search.

How many Alfords, or any surname, do you know called "Malice" or "Milace"?

We are familiar with the MAULDIN-ALFORD relationship. The granddaughters of Thomas J. Mauldin were the children of James Noel Welch Alford who married Frances L. Mauldin on 24 December 1889 in Jack County. They are the

grandparents of AAFA #592 Walter Morrison "Corky" Clerihew. Rachel, who Kenneth mentioned, married Rev. Robert E. Alspaugh.

The "draft" data that AAFA has extracted from the soundex record of the 1880–1910 census have a number of families in which both parents were born in Tennessee; however, none of them seem to fit any of the other information pertaining to Kenneth's family. It does present one interesting idea though. We know that a B.D. (Britton Drake) Alford was one of the early settlers of northwest Texas. That is the general area where Kenneth's father was born. He was the son of Wiley Alford and Sophia Drake of Tennessee, and Wiley goes back to our North Carolina family. He and his family were in Bowie County in 1850. He also owned land in Tarrent County, some west of Ft. Worth and some southwest of Fort Worth. There was a Tennessee family in Red River county for the 1880 census but they are all identified with initials. Who knows them?

There was a family in Red River County in the 1900 census, and they had a son born July 1895, the same month and year as Kenneth's father—seems more than coincidence. This son was extracted as Wiggin M. Alford, but some of you know how it is transcribing census writing. This may be the very person we are looking for. Someone needs to research the 1900 detailed census to see what this family looks like.

Milace had a sister RACHEL ALFORD who married Harris COOK.

We need the help of all members who have access to Texas records in this search for data about Kenneth's father. �

"Alfords" in the 1850 Alabama Census

The 1850 U.S. census was the first census that collected data from all members of the household, not just the head of household. Since it was also the first census that included the age, sex, and birthplace of the people enumerated, it is an extremely valuable genealogical tool. Real estate values for heads of household are included, as well as occupations for working adults.

This publication is the product of efforts by the AAFA census project team. An initial list of names to be extracted was pulled from published indexes and, in some cases, supplemented by unindexed entries. The every-name extraction was performed on the microfilm source by one or more persons and the results reviewed and checked by the team leader. The resulting product was then sent to other team members who revisited the microfilm and verified the data for completeness and accuracy. The results of that review were processed and reviewed again by the team leader. AAFA wishes to acknowledge the efforts of Lucille Mehrkam, Mary Louise Reynolds, Randall L. Alford, William Mitchner, Ronald Head, Robin Sterling, and Andrew Leath in preparation of this publication.

The resulting publication is not intended to reflect either the "true" facts or what descendant families believe to be the facts. It is also not guaranteed to be without error. Nevertheless, every attempt has been made to provide a complete and faithful representation of the information recorded on the original enumeration forms. All spelling variations are included.

The column "MSW" between birth place (BP) and color (CO) is for tabulating responses to questions asked in the census as to married within the year, attended school within the year, or cannot read and write. M in the column means they were Married that year, S means they were in School and W means they could not read and Write. The categories on each line appear in the following order: Name, Sex, Age, Birthplace, MSW, Color, Occupation, Property. The order of the information on the line following the county name is the name of the "Township, District, etc.," followed by the "Enumeration Date."

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Famous Early Americans from Alford, England

Alberta Alford Skillen, AAFA #15, sent a copy of a 10-page pamphlet titled "Alford and America" printed, it seems, by the Alford and District Civic Trust of Alford, Lincolnshire, England. In the December 1992 issue of AAFA ACTION, "A Visit to Alford, Lincolnshire, England" on pp. 40–42 showed photos that Don Alford, AAFA #59, and his wife took when visiting there during the summer of 1992. Following are some excerpts from the pamphlet that show some connections of that town to the United States. Specifically, two famous early Americans who had origins in Alford: John Smith, the early explorer and adventurer, and Anne Marbury Hutchinson, religious dissident.

Captain John Smith

On Saturday, 9th January 1580, George and Alice Smith entered Willoughby Church carrying their first born son for baptism. George Smith, a shy retiring man, had acquired a small farm at Castle Carlton and leased land from Lord Willoughby de Eresby, Lord of the Manor of Willoughby.

As John grew up he must have accompanied his father across the flat marshland over the South end becke bridge" to Alford Market. By 1588, or even before, he had entered Alford Grammar School and come under the influence of the 30 year old Rev. Francis Marbury.

Marbury ... had a caustic tongue which he had used against the recruitment of unqualified clergy to the established Church. This, and his strong individual personality had resulted in his imprisonment for his beliefs. His position as Master of Alford Grammar School was taken in 1589 by a Mr. Cuttle, but he continued to live in the town and became a lecturer at Alford Church where he achieved recognition as a

prominent preacher.

.... George Smith died and was buried in Willoughby on April 3rd. John, then 16, ... inherited his father's Willoughby farm and seven acres of pasture....

In the autumn of 1600 he travelled ... to the Continent.

The 20 year old Smith now embarked up on an amazing series of adventures which were to require all his fortitude and determination. [From 1600–1604 he engaged in various military adventures throughout Europe, even indulging in piracy in the Atlantic and



eventually returning to England.]

Smith now became involved with the ever increasing circle of men interested in the colonisation of Virginia. In 1606 the Virginia Company obtained its Charter. Sealed instructions were compiled by the Company and on Friday 19th December 1606 the tiny fleet of three ships 'fell from London.' On board were 105 men including John Smith....

[During the next two years Smith explored the new land from the base of Jamestown, making an alliance with the chief Powhatan and being saved by his 11 year old daughter Pocahontas. In 1608 he was elected President of Virginia but held that office only one year, returning to England. From there he sailed in 1614 to the area he named New England, exploring the Massachusetts Bay area, where he saw the opportunities for colonization in the area he named Plymouth, "an excellent good harbor, good land; and no want of anything but industrious people."]

In 1620 Smith met the Pilgrims and offered to lead them to New England, but their incompatibility of temperaments made this impossible. They did, however, rely on his maps and charts for their voyage....

[History books have taught us that the Pilgrims were really heading for Virginia and somehow mistakenly landed at Plymouth. However, the information in this pamphlet contradicts that. Note the above, plus the following:]

By 1616 Smith began to emerge as an unblushing promoter and published "A description of New England"....

On June 21st 1631, very ill and near to death Smith attempted, but failed to sign his will. He died the same day and was buried in St. Sepulchre's Church, London.

Anne Marbury Hutchinson

In 1591, while John Smith laboured at Alford Grammar School, Bridget Marbury gave birth to Anne, the second of her 13 children. Anne grew to be an imaginative and impressionable girl, who found her father a man of vigour with a demanding and independant [sic] personality. At the age of 14 she went to live with her parents in London. After her father's death in 1611, she married William Hutchinson and they returned to raise a

family in Alford. William was a successful clothier who lacked the dynamic qualities of Francis Marbury. For twenty-two years the Hutchinsons lived in Alford. William's business prospered and he became Governor of the Grammar School. Anne acquired skill in nursing and tended the sick.

Between 1615 and 1629 Anne came under the influence of John Cotton. She attended his sermons in Boston [England] and her orthodox Anglican views changed to Cottonian Puritanism.

In 1630 plague struck Alford. Anne nursed her daughters Susanna, aged 14, and Elizabeth aged 8, until they died within a month of each other. For twelve months Anne withdrew from her neighbours seeking solace from her religious beliefs. At about this time Ann's sister-in-law, Mary married the Rev. John Wheelwright, Vicar of Bilsby since 1623. Wheelwright was born at Saleby and probably attended Alford Grammar School....

At Bilsby, Wheelwright gained a reputation for his godliness and the modesty of his preaching, while developing his ideas of man's dependence on God's free grace and rejecting any idea that man's work bore any merit in God's eyes.

[By 1634 John Cotton and the Hutchinson family had left for Boston, Massachusetts; there William Hutchinson built a large house to accommodate his extended family. By 1636 William was chosen as one of Boston's Selectmen and was awarded a 600 acre farm at Braintree as well as Taylor's Island in Boston Harbor.]

Anne's nursing skill and neighbourly solicitude gained her the affection and gratitude of a large part of the community. On Sundays and Thursdays she led the family to hear John Cotton's misty statements of an already ambiguous doctrine. She soon began to hold

weekly meetings for the women of the town in which they discussed the sermon. Soon the menfolk began to attend, among them the charming but unstable Harry Vane who in May 1636 was elected Governor. Anne began to clash with the Rev. John Wilson, the pastor of Boston Church and soon was supported by the major part of the congregation.

At this stage John Wheelwright arrived accompanied by his wife and children, and the aged Susanna Hutchinson (William's mother). He was warmly received in Boston and entertained by the Hutchinsons. But the Massachusetts Bay Colony 'was not set up for tolerating times.' The advocats of orthodox Puritanism became alarmed....

[By the end of 1637 John Wheel-wright, Harry Vane, and the Hutchinson faction, called Antinomians, were eventually destroyed by the Orthodox Puritans, led by Winthrop.]

On the 3rd August, Henry Vane departed for England where he was later knighted and became a Member of Parliament. In 1656 he bought Belleau Manor, near Alford. His independent thought and support of Parliament however, led to his execution in 1662.

.... Anne Hutchinson was called before the General Court. She replied to Winthrop's questions coolly and with great skill, but was sentenced to be imprisoned in Roxbury till her banishment in the following Spring. Her followers were systematically disenfranchised, fined or banished, and their weapons confiscated. A group of her supporters led by William Coddington decided to set up a settlement in Rhode Island.

Anne was further interrogated before the Boston congregation and was excommunicated. She then made her way to the home her husband had prepared for her in the Rhode Island settlement. Before long this too was the scene of fresh theological conflict. In 1642, when William died, Anne took her six youngest children and moved to a lonely spot on Long Island Sound within Dutch territory. There in the late summer of 1642 she and five of her children were ruthlessly tomahawked by a band of Indians.

The Antinomians, as Hutchinson's followers were called, had struck a heavy blow—if not for freedom of thought certainly for the heterogeneity which leads to freedom of thought—but in so doing they aroused a fresh dread of deviation from orthodox ideas. ❖
