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Ten Years Ago

ASSOCIATION was in the last stage of its pre-natal phase.

I had been working with several others, primarily Capt. Lodwick H. Alford of Sea Island, GA, and the late Julius M. "Pooley" Alford of McComb, MS.

I looked for some rare words of wisdom from this period of our history and came up blank. During most of 1986 Wick and I were deeply involved in getting his book published. He did all the research and collected the data, and I computerized it, prepared the manuscript and had it "printed." That subject dominated our 1986 correspondence. Apparently we conducted all AAFA business by phone.

Looking in Julius' file I was a bit luckier. Julius was not noted for writing. More often than not he called. It was common to get a 3x5 card with a few words or something stapled to it.

On August 5, 1986 Pooley wrote "Thanks for everything—I am still interested in helping you with the Alford Family Association when we both have the time to get back on it. Later he sent a 3x5 card to which he had clipped a copy of The Ligon Family and Kinsmen Association constitution. His note: "Gil: This might be helpful if we start an Alford Family Association."

As we moved into 1987—just as we are about to move into 1997—there was a lot to be done and we had to get organized.

At that time I was publishing a newsletter called "About Alfords" and in issue number 18, January 1987, we announced the formation of the ALFORD AMERICAN FAMILY ASSOCIATION. Included with that issue was a copy of our "Proposed Constitution and By-Laws."

The schedule to get the organization operational was: 1987—contact most Alfords of the USA... we are still working on that; 1988—appoint a nominating and elections committee. I, as a committe of one, forced Wick to be President. Weston Adams to be Vice President, Pooley to be Treasurer and Nancy Alford to be Secretary. I promised all of them they wouldn't have much to do; 1989—"Hold the first annual meeting, or if this is not possible, hold the second annual election by mail. . . If a full scale family meeting cannot be scheduled then attempt a meeting of the Board of Trustees and the Executive Committee." We had our first meeting in 1988 and the second in 1989.

The first application arrived having been postmarked Feb 20 1987 and member 001 was assigned to Alicia Roundy Lee (now Houston).

Who would ever have thought that ten years later we would have so many great workers (need more though), have so many members, and have had so many successful meetings? ❖

ach of the lineages below was sent to the member for review and comment. Appropriate changes and corrections were made on those that were returned. Those for which there was no response are being published as is but are correct to the best of our knowledge. Data was not available to do a lineage for members #819 and #823.

NEW THIS ISSUE: As AAFA grows it is becoming more and more "family branch" oriented. Therefore, effective with this issue, the family branch will be shown after the member's name.

The footnote numbers that appear for some records in the far right column refer to comments at the end of the lineages or in previous issues. (Due to space limitations, we do not repeat comments. Contact the secretary for back issues.) Those with "11" have comments in this issue, while other footnote numbers are in previous

quarterlies. See the references at the beginning of this set of endnotes.

It is important to note that the lineages begin with the first Alford ancestor—not always a parent. Surname "Alford" is to be assumed unless "Alvord," "Halford," etc. is shown.

Dates are shown as year, month, day. A "ca" following a date means "circa" or "about." A "?" means we are not sure or don't know. A "<" means before the date and ">" means after the date. "E" or "Est" means estimated. Locations are usually expressed as a state and county abbreviation.

Remember that AAFA is not presenting this as proven factual data. It represents the best we have and is only as good as the data reported by members. In a few rare cases there may be some conclusion reached by the compiler. This data does not come from the same computer file used in the compilation of the branch genealogies. Members are requested to bring differences, errors and omissions to our attention.

Conflicting reports on day of birth: 2nd or 27th.

FRA820SWD

Frank Alford was killed in a mine near Lone Elk (West Joplin) and was buried in Fairview Cemetery—the oldest cemetery in Joplin. "Later they wanted to put a road thru where he was buried. Some people had their relatives dug up and buried elsewhere. Frank Alford's family did not hear about folks being asked to remove bodies—so he was left and the road went over his grave."—Mary Stanley AAFA #812, July 1996.

ISH815AL

According to the 1850 St. Clair Co AL census, he was born in Tennessee about 1812. The 1860 Sabine Co TX census says it was Georgia about 1817. The 1870 Sabine Co TX census says it was 1816 in Georgia. Some records show marriage in May rather than August—which is correct? (7/96)

JOH750VA?

Orville Alford, AAFA #390, shows Lucy with a question mark. John's name was sometimes spelled HALFORD.

JOH804NC

Orville Alford, AAFA #390, a descendant, shows he died sometime in the 1880's. Extensions on this line come from research done by Orville.

sop845ky

The cemetery where both are buried is about a mile and half from Rockhold. It is a large cemetery whose name is not known at this time.

WES820VT

Doris Swanick's family group record shows his death as 17 June or July 1913. Cornelia's full middle name was BIGLOW.

WIL838KY

Margaret (Mrs. Henry) Alford shows Serilda with a "(Rildy)" in her name. Was she married before her marriage to William Thomas? If so, are there any details?

WIL844KY01

William was known as "Wild Bill Alford" as well as "Fiddlin Bill Alford." He lived to be 83 years old and married three times. He lied about his age with the hope of entering service in the Civil War, and the gravestone bears the generally accepted erroneous birth date. Census records and interview with a daughter revealed the correct birth date.—Ed Alford

vio872ky

From family stories we have learned little about Viola prior to her marriage to our Grandfather, Frank Albert Dann. Her first marriage was to a man known only as "Mr. Holloway" in Bowling Green, KY. She was very young at the time (about 13-14), and her father, William Henderson Alford,

told her he wanted nothing more to do with her for marrying this "older man." Mr. Holloway decided that he would take his young bride west. They traveled by wagons to Arkansas. We don't know what happened to this "Mr. Holloway," but it was said that he left her with a family he met and went on his way.

She then married a Frank Boudry. He died and she married his brother, James. We don't know what happened in that marriage, but it ended. She had no children with these husbands. She met and married Frank Albert Dann and spent the remainder of her life with him. They met in Arkansas and married there, but we don't know where or when they were married. We do know that they lived there the rest of their lives and died there and are buried in Pine Bluff, Arkansas. They traveled back to Kentucky with their children once to visit family, and she was forgiven by her father. After they returned to Arkansas, her sisters and their husbands came to visit from time to time, but not often as travel was then by wagons.

I haven't been able to find the birth date for Frank Albert Dann, or where he was born, but it most likely would have been in Missouri or Arkansas. I am still trying to find the date of their marriage and the place. Any help would be appreciated.— Ellen Poland AAFA #818-GNP, July 27, 1996 �



Hopkins and Alfred

Jack Kinabrew, AAFA #87, sent two pages from an unidentified book containing information about Augustus Alfred. Connecticut clock maker.

Considerable insight into the conduct of the business of clockmaking and a broader picture of the significance of alarms can be gained by summarizing the activities of the Hopkins and Alfred shop in Harwinton, Connecticut....

Edward Hopkins, born January 31, 1797, died April 25, 1876. Augustus Alfred, born January 20, 1806, died January 12, 1864.

The "Company Book," a handwritten ledger, begins January 21, 1834, and ends February 26, 1842, and consists of 141 pages.... Much other business than that of clocks is recorded, including notes about groceries, clothing and farming matters....

According to the records, Hopkins & Alfred purchased about 5 acres of land on November 5, 1829, of James and Odiah Loomis. Later the same month, on November 28, they secured from David and Caleb Morse the right to build a dam and use the resulting flow back of water for a shop to be built. They purchased additional land on June 8, 1830, and then on May 13, 1833, from Erastus Baldwin.

For the period covered by the "Company Book," the record shows that some 3,397 clocks were sold, for \$17,018.96....

The business decline of 1838 was catastrophic for Hopkins & Alfred. They must have resorted to running the farm, during 1839; ultimately closing the shop and records, settling up in 1842.... •

Burt Alvord, Outlaw Sheriff—Part 1

By Gil Alford

I first heard of Burt Alvord several years ago when Seanne Carrigan, AAFA #335, called me from California to report having found a headstone on Boot Hill in Tombstone, AZ, with an inscription that said "Shot by Burt Alvord."

Burt is mentioned in A Genealogy of the Descendants of Alexander Alvord, An Early Settler of Windsor, Conn., and Northampton, Mass., by Samuel Morgan Alvord (Webster, NY: 1908). As you will see below, it merely reported that "he is a well known character in the Southwest."

That proved to be a gross understatement. Just today, as I write this, we received a large package of "Alford papers" from Jean H. Brown, AAFA #143. Her cover letter said, "Most of this information is on Burt Alford. It's hard to separate fact from fiction here. I was planning to write a little story on him for the AAFA newsletter, but got kind of side tracked."

I find the information most interesting—different sources have conflicting information about Burt, but all agree that he was both a lawman and an outlaw. We have too much to cover in one issue of the quarterly, so watch future issues for more. In this issue, is Burt's ancestor table or ahnentafel prepared using the data as it was published in the 1908 genealogy. Following it are two biographical articles from reference works.

Alvord, Burton, 1866-c.1910, U.S., law enfor. off.-west. outl. Moving west with his father, a justice of the peace, Alvord settled in Tombstone, Ariz., where, as a teenager, he found a job as a stable hand at the O.K. Corral. Shortly after he began work there, Alvord witnessed one of the most spectacular gunfights of the Old West, the showdown shoot-out between the Earp-Holliday clan and the Clanton-McLowery outlaws, a bullet-spitting incident that would remain with him for the remainder of his days. Though he was only fifteen at the time of this legendary gun battle on Oct. 26, 1881, Alvord watched carefully as the Earps bested the outlaws by their cool composure and deliberate aim, a hallmark that was to be Alvord's adopted character when acting as a lawman or an outlaw.

At age twenty in 1886, Alvord was selected as a deputy by John Slaughter,

the newly-elected sheriff of Cochise County. Slaughter had already seen the mettle of this young man a year earlier when Alvord had been challenged by a local Tombstone tough ubiquitously named "Six-shooter Jimmy." Both men had gone for their guns and Alvord had killed his opponent with one deliberately-aimed shot. From 1886 to 1890 Alvord served as Slaughter's back-up man in many a shoot-out with outlaws, rustlers, and gunmen of all kinds. Alvord accompanied Slaughter and another deputy, Cesario Lucero, in May 1888, in a pursuit after three Mexican train robbers, tracking these men down to their camp near the Whetstone Mountains one night. The lawmen found the thieves sleeping in their blankets around a smoldering campfire and ordered them to surrender. The three bandits dove for their guns and a pitched battle took place in which one of the train robbers was shot. When he fell, the other two men meekly surrendered.

A month later, in the same area, on May 7, 1888, Alvord helped Slaughter capture three more Mexican bandits. Again, the lawmen crept up on their prey at night and caught the robbers asleep. A gun battle ensued and one of the bandits was killed, another wounded, the unharmed bandit surrendered quickly. The wounded Mexican, however, managed to escape. The following year, in February of 1889, Alvord began to slip from his role as the ramrod tough deputy. He began drinking heavily and frequently mixed with the outlaw element that drifted into Tombstone. On one occasion, Alvord got drunk with two surly cowboys named Fortino and Fuller, the threesome then in a private house near Slaughter's residence. Fuller exploded over a remark made by Fortino and seized Alvord's six-gun, shooting Fortino to death with it. The deputy was too drunk to stop Fuller at the time. When Slaughter arrived and learned of his deputy's involvement and how Alvord's own weapon was

used in a killing, the sheriff exploded, verbally chastising Alvord in front of dozens of witnesses. The deputy was put on notice; either he mended his ways or he would be an unemployed lawman.

Alvord soured on Slaughter and Tombstone following this incident and he moved to Fairbank, Ariz., in the early 1890s where he became the town constable. His drinking and cavorting with known criminals soon caused town fathers to ask for his resignation and Alvord moved on to Wilcox, Ariz., where he was made the town constable. He continued to drink heavily and most of the young outlaws labeled him a hopeless alcoholic from whom they had nothing to fear. One such gunman was Billy King, a rough-andtumble cowboy who harassed Wilcox one day in 1898. Alvord appeared and ordered King to put up his gun and stop racing his horse up and down the main street. King gave the constable a winning smile and suggested that the two "settle matters over drinks" in the nearby saloon. Alvord and King went to the saloon and belted down a few drinks, but the cowboy grew sullen and threatening so Alvord asked him to step outside. As soon as King went through the back door of the saloon, Alvord drew his pistol and fired every bullet in his gun into King's face, killing him instantly. Burt Alvord was not a man to waste time.

By the turn of the century Alvord had given up on keeping the peace. He would rather break it and join with the outlaws he had befriended over the years. He had physically changed into a dour-faced man with a bald head and a black beard; his dark eyes were full and anger and menace. For some years he led a band of ruthless train robbers. He was arrested first in 1900 and then in 1903 when he and his sidekick, Billy Stiles, were imprisoned. Both men managed to escape after Stiles was made a trustee at the Tombstone Jail and stole the keys to the lockup,

allowing him to set Alvord free. Alvord, then much wanted, reasoned that the best way to effect a permanent escape was to play dead. He and Stiles located two corpses (they either killed two Mexicans or unearthed them from recent graves) and sent these bodies to Tombstone in sealed coffins, spreading the word that the pine boxes contained the wanted outlaws, Burt Alvord and Billy Stiles. The ruse failed, however, when suspicious lawmen broke open the coffins and found the ripening bodies of the Mexicans.

Arizona rangers set off in grim pursuit of Alvord and Stiles, locating the pair at their secret camp [in Mexico]. The rangers ignored international law and crossed the border into Mexico to confront the two bad men. Both Alvord and Stiles went for their guns and both were wounded in the battle, Alvord shot twice in the leg, Stiles in the arm. Alvord was immobilized and could not reach his horse while Stiles managed to get into the saddle and ride wildly out of the trap, escaping. The rangers took Alvord into custody and he was sent to the Arizona prison at Yuma, serving two years for robbery. He was released in 1906 and decided that he would leave the American west forever, seeking his fortune in Central America. He was later reported to be in Venezuela and Honduras and, as late as 1910, the year he was presumed to have died, seen working as a canal employee in Panama.

ALVORD, Burt (1866–1910?): Lawman and outlaw

A notorious law officer turned bad, Burt Alvord seems to have enjoyed long simultaneous careers as a lawman and bandit. The son of a roving justice of the peace, Alvord was a youth in Tombstone during the time of the vaunted gunfight at the O.K. Corral. Although only 15, he was astute enough to spot one of the underlying motives for the battle—control of the county sheriff's office, with the special duty of collecting taxes, which might or might not be turned over to the treasury.

When the celebrated lawman John Slaughter was elected sheriff of Cochise County in 1886, Alvord, who was 20 at the time, became his chief deputy and began building a solid reputation as an enforcer of the law, tracing down numerous rustlers and other thieves. There is little doubt, however, that during the same period he was also an outlaw. In time, Slaughter, an honest man, became disenchanted with his deputy. Yet when the sheriff retired from his post in 1890, no crimes had been pinned on Alvord. In the mid-1890's Alvord switched from wearing a badge to rustling cattle in Mexico. But by 1899 he was a constable in Willcox, Arizona Territory despite some murders under his belt. Here Alvord teamed up with Billie Stiles to pull off a number of train robberies and other holdups. The entire Alvord-Stiles gang was captured after a train robbery near Cochise in September 1899, but they escaped from jail and went back in business. Alvord and Stiles were caught again in 1903 but once more broke free. After that, Alvord tried to fake their deaths, even sending coffins allegedly carrying their remains to Tombstone. The trick failed, and the law kept hunting for the two outlaw chiefs. Finally, the Arizona Rangers swept into Mexico in 1904 and cornered Alvord.... Alvord was wounded and brought back to Arizona. This time he spent two years in prison. Thereafter, Alvord's record becomes murky. He was spotted, according to various stories, all over Latin America and even in Jamaica. When a canal worker in Panama died in 1910, he was said to be Alvord, but the identification was not conclusive. �

The every name extraction was performed by one or more team members using a microfilm copy of the original census. The results were checked and reviewed by the team leader. The extraction sheets were then sent to a member to do the computer entry. After a review of the printout by the team leader the resulting product was then sent to other team members who revisited the microfilm and verified the data for completeness and accuracy. The results of that review were processed through the computer again and reviewed one more time by the team leader. Only then was it approved for publication.

Mary Alford Helms Memorial Scholarship

ary Edna Alford Helms, AAFA #407, died on 21 February, 1996. A tribute to her appeared in "In Remembrance of AAFA Members," *AAFA ACTION*, Spring 1996.

In July 1996 the Mary Alford Helms Memorial Scholarship Fund was established in memory of Mrs. Helms, a 1956 graduate of the Baptist Nursing School in Little Rock, Arkansas. The \$25,000 initial gift will provide nursing students with much needed scholarships for years to come.

The purpose of the fund is to provide, on an annual basis, interest from the gift in the form of a scholarship to a student nurse. The fund will be invested and the interest earned on the principal will be used to make the scholarship awards. A portion of the interest money will be reinvested in the principal to insure the perpetuity of this scholarship. The scholarship will make it possible for deserving students to continue their education in the School of Nursing. It will provide students who demonstrate scholastic ability, nursing competence and a sincere desire for increased knowledge of nursing with the means to meet their student obligations for tuition expenses.

The family of Mrs. Helms will be notified each year of the recipient and will be given the opportunity to meet the student. The scholarship can be presented at the awards ceremony by a member of her family.

The criteria can be set by Mrs. Helms' family. Below are examples of the criteria used for scholarship recipient selections:

- 1. The student must be a graduate of an accredited Arkansas High School or have received their GED.
- 2. The student must have a 3.0 or above grade average.
- 3. The student must have met the standard requirements for admission to the Baptist School of Nursing.
- 4. The student must be enrolled full-time in the Baptist School of Nursing as an RN candidate and have completed Level 1.
- 5. The student must complete an application and submit along with documentation of their financial need to the Scholarship Committee.
- 6. The Scholarship Committee will review applications, student records and will make a report to Baptist Health Foundation for issuance of the scholarship.

When the student who receives the scholarship becomes a productive member of the nursing profession, he/she will be encouraged to provide an education for others as a way to express his/her appreciation for the opportunity given to him/her by Mrs. Helms' family.

Julius Caesar Alford, War Horse of Troup, GA

Robin Alford Sterling, AAFA #320, has obtained from the Alabama State Archives a microfilm copy (16mm) of the reel that contains the Alford section of the Alabama Families Surname Clippings File. The Archives states that this "file consists mainly of clippings about Alabamians from Alabama newspapers and contains notices of appointments, marriages, legal proceedings, general news items, personal, obituaries, as well as articles and correspondence about family histories." Robin has transcribed much of the material, which we will be publishing in AAFA ACTION. This article incorporates the archive files that pertain to Julius Caesar Alford, 1799-1863. Some of the information from the files is incorrec—AAFA does not concur with all content and has not commented every inconsistency.

From pp. 278–280: this is a typed narrative attributed as "Prepared by Margaret Cox Tuggle, a granddaughter, of LaGrange, Ga." There is no date associated with this on the file, but it was written by a lady who lived through the Civil War.

he Alfords of Wake County, North Carolina served the cause of freedom during the American Revolution.

Lodwick Alford emigrated to Georgia, settling first in Greene County. He was fresh from the war of 1812, where he ranked as Captain. His wife, Caroline Judith Jackson, was the daughter of Reuben Jackson of North Carolina, who won distinction at the battle of New Orleans. Their oldest son, Julius C. Alford, was born at Greensboro, May 10, 1799.

When his father moved to Troup County he remained for a while at Greensboro, studying law under Col. Foster. He married Eliza Cook. Judge Cone married one of her sisters and Rev. Chas. Sanders the other. As the whole current of Julius Alford's life was influenced by this marriage, I will digress to relate something of the history of these beautiful sisters. There lived in Florida under the Spanish rule an English Gentleman, George Cook, with his wife and four little daughters. It was an ideal home as pictured to these children in after years by a faithful servant. Troubles with the Indians arose: Col. Cook left home to meet the threatening enemy. He was killed in battle and his body-servant, a faithful slave, fled home to warn the plantation that the red skins were coming. The news that "Master" was killed caused a panic in the negro quarters and all the slaves fled except this devoted body-servant. He went to the house and told the terrible news to his mistress and helped her to escape to the woods with the children. The flaming dwelling lighted their lurid way. The mother died from terror and exposure, leaving four little girls to the care of her brother, Nathaniel Ashley of Louisville, Ga.

He had them educated in the celebrated Moravian school at Salem, N.C.

After his marriage to Eliza Cook, Julius Alford moved to Troup County, then in possession of the Creek Indians. His father having built a home five miles from the point on the Chattahoochie now known as West Point, Julius decided to be near him and settled at the place now known as LaGrange. He suggested the name of this town at a public meeting, being an ardent admirer of LaFayette whose home bore that name. He named his youngest daughter Antionette LaFayette. About this time troubles with the Indians increased and Julius Alford commanded the forces that met them at West Point. He drove them below Columbus and defeated them at the battle of Chichesahatchie, driving

them into the Seminole Country. Col. Alford, as he was now called, was elected to Congress in 1838 and in 1840. It was during his congressional career that he received the soubriquet of "The War Horse of Troup."

I quote from a letter written by his sonin-law, Mr. B.J. Baldwin of Alabama. "It appears that there was a bill introduced in the House of Representatives to have all the Creek Indians removed to the West. A Northern member made a speech in opposition to an appropriation for that purpose, in which he made light of the terrible crimes that the Indians had perpetrated upon the helpless women and children of Georgia and Alabama. Col. Alford rose in reply. He had magnificient height and bearing and a voice like a bugle call. He said he did not think his Northern friend was cognizant of the condition of affairs within the borders of the Indian Nation. "Could he but see what I have seen and hear what I have heard, it would make the blood run cold in his veins." Oh, that terrible war-whoop, and actually gave that war-whoop in the halls of Congress. Its piercing horror startled the listless members, their hearts sprang to the rescue of the women and children who were exposed to its frequent midnight challenge and the bill passed.

Perhaps the Orator's heart was fired not only by what he had seen and heard but as well by the horrors of his wife's early orphanage. She was at that time at home in LaGrange keeping it happy for his return. But at this period misfortunes awaited him, and the sudden death of his beloved wife broke up all the plans of his life. He moved to Tuskegee, Alabama and afterwards to the prairies below Montgomery. He left his home at LaGrange, the hill where now stands "The LaGrange Female College" and threw himself into politics in Alabama but his

fortunate star had set, although kept too busy by the practice of his profession and large farming interests to grow morose. He spent much of the latter part of his life in the pleasures of the chase, making long camp hunts with his son-in-law Mr. Baldwin. My father, Mr. A.E. Cox, who was his sonin-law also has told me that Col. Alford was not a secessionist, but being a delegate to the Secession Convention at Montgomery went with the majority heartily, to make it unanimous, and although then in feeble health raised a company in his county which he supplied from his private means for several years. I well remember when I made visits during the civil war seeing the plantation loose weaving cloth, the women knitting socks and the tannery making leather for shoes for "The Alford Guards."

Late in life he had married a woman devoted to the Southern Cause and it was a beautiful sight to see, as I once did, his lovely little daughter seated high on the gate post handing socks to each member of "The Alford Guards" as they filed by the gate going off to Montgomery. He was now very feeble. My last visit to him was to take him some medicine my mother sent. Medicines were then almost unobtainable. My Uncle William Alford of West Point went also, they were devoted brothers. Montgomery was then held by our forces. We obtained a permit to pass the lines and went in a hack which carried mail out ten miles. At that point we secured two horses and made the last twenty miles horseback. We found my grandfather very ill but cheerful. He told his brother that he hoped to live to see the end of the war but he did not, he died January 1863.

Col. Alford was of an ardent temperment, which often found vent in bursts of eloquency, his oratorical powers were intensified in his son, George Cook Alford, a brilliant lawyer of Alabama who gave his life to the Confederacy. His grandson, Hon. A.H.

Cox of Atlanta has a good likeness of "The Old War Horse of Troup."

[The following appears to have been clipped from a Who's Who book on Alabamians.]

Alford, Julius Caesar, lawyer and member of congress, was born May 10, 1799, in Greensboro, N.C., and died January, 1863, near Montgomery; son of Ludwick and Judith (Jackson) Alford, the former of England who emigrated to America and located in Wake County, served as captain in the War of 1812, removed to Greene county, and later to Troup County, Ga. [AAFA NOTE: Lodwick was the son of Julius Alford, born in NC (not England), the grandson of Lodwick Alford, and the great-grandson of James Alford of VA.]; grandson of Reuben Jackson, of North Carolina. who won distinction at the battle of New Orleans, Mr. Alford was educated in the common schools and an academy in North Carolina; studied law under Col. Foster of Greensboro, N.C., was admitted to the bar, and began the practice of law at LaGrange, Ga. He commanded a company in the Creek War of 1836: was elected as a States Rights Whig to the 24th congress to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of George W.B. Towns; was defeated for re-election to the 25th congress, but was re-elected as a Harrison Whig to the 26th and 27th congresses. Because of his fearless and stormy declaration in popular assemblies, he was known as the "War horse of Troup." He moved to Tuskegee about 1850, resumed the practice of law and later settled near Montgomery; was a prominent member of the Union convention that assembled in Montgomery in 1852 and ran for re-election

in congress, 1855, but was defeated, after which he retired from public life. Married: (1) Eliza Cook; (2) Mrs. (Baldwin) Underwood; (3) Mrs. Martha (Herin) Boswell, widow of Thomas Coke Boswell, and daughter of Henry and Sally (McClendon) Herin.

My Dear Mr. Bronnon,

My grandfather Julius Caesar Alford died at his prairie home, about thirty (30) miles from Montgomery, Pike Co., and was buried in the County church yard near his home. Born June 10, 1799, Wake Co. N.C. Died Jan 1, 1863.

His father was Lodwick Alford, not Ludwick as per your letter. Mr. Mack Beale must have gained his idea of his being buried in Opelika from the fact that later on his widow lived in Opelika, Ala. Mrs. Travis, (formerly Miss Jane Beale) an aunt of Mr. Mack Beale might be able to aid you as her brother, Mr. C.H. Beale knew all the Alford history.

I have quite a bit of the history of the Alford family, but just now am not able to put it in shape to send you and there are links missing, rather conflicting.

Mrs. Margaret Alford Hogg of Macon, Ga. is a daughter of Mr. William Alford and I have written her asking for information. Mrs. J.W. Hogg, 678 Courtland St., Macon, Ga.

Some records say Julius C. Alford lived in Montgomery Co; some say Pike Co. Certainly his last home was about 30 miles below Montgomery and that he died was buried. This we know from records in the handwriting of one eldest sister, Mrs Margaret A. (Cox) Tuggle in which she tells of her last visit to our grandfather Julius Caesar Alford, in company with Mr. William Alford son of Julius C. Alford.

Brothers[?] of Julius C. Alford, he being the eldest child of Lodwick Alford, Jr. and Judith Jackson.

Dear Sir,

To reply to your questions of Aug. 18, 1916, I have written to members of my family, and made a visit to the grave-yard at the Old Alford Place near West Point, Ga.

I enclose you the short letter I received from my mother's aged cousin, now 86 years of age.

I regret that I cannot give you the names of the parents of Lodwick Alford, but of Judith Jackson. I can give the names of his father, Capt. Reuben Jackson of N.C. who was killed-one of the few at the Battle of New Orleans. Upon the handsome and well kept marble tomb of his wife, Judith Jackson Alford, Capt. Lodwick Alford recorded the name of his wife's father.

Living to extreme old age, Lodwick Alford buried many of his family and his wife Judith Jackson slept years by the place he kept by her side for himself. He was born 1775, died 1857, 82 years of age. It was this Lodwick Alford and his wife Judith Jackson Alford (daughter of Capt Reuben Jackson of N.C.) who were the parents of Julius C. Alford.

You ask a definite statement as to whether both Lodwick Alford and his wife were both from Wake County, N.C. I cannot say definitely. I infer so, because both men were in the Battle of New Orleans in the same company and they were son and father-in-law. Unfortunately, the old Alford Bible was burned not very long ago in the house of one of the living Alfords. I was much disappointed when I asked to see it to find that it had been destroyed. You see that I have no way to get the names of Lodwick Alford's parents as he emigrated from England [see previous AAFA NOTE]. I suppose to Wake county, N.C.

In the interest of correct history, the records of the courthouses in North Carolina could be examined perhaps even now in Wake County. But no one cares or is able to afford the expense of verifying tradition.

I wish to request Mr. Beale through you to furnish the history of my grandfather's life, the names of his family and children after his first marriage. I was with them very little, and I see my memory is failing fast and I am not now able to rely upon the correctness of what I read. I am now seventy-five years old.

Dear Cad,

I am about ready to send some papers to your Department of Archives and History. [Some words illegible] Dear [Sir?], I have been to the Alford house recently. I found the old house standing in very good repair and the burial grounds well kept with marble cover over each grave. Now I have come to this conclusion. Julius C. Alford was a man belonging to two states: Georgia and Alabama and his first brilliant career in Georgia was the short life of youth. His long life in Alabama is his history. I well remember upon a visit to him during the Confederacy when Uncle Bill Alford and I as my mother's representative went to Montgomery from West Point to carry contraband medicine obtained by my father in Virginia through the blockade to our sick grandfather and brother that we found Julius C. Alford surrounded by wife and children of that good wife working for the Confederacy under his direction.

The looms were weaving cloth. Shoes were being made from the tannery for the Alford guards. I saw recruits march by his gate going to the army. While his pretty step daughter sat upon the gate post and handed socks to each recruit as he passed. Those socks were knit by his family. A devoted Confederate, he was working for the Alford guards though fast failing in health. [Some words illegible] Now I realize as never before the sorrow that [I do not have] the accurate memory I was once so blest with. I am now seventy-five years old. You and others in Alabama can still have names and dates correct to record his long life as an Alabamian, but I have not.

I have sent all I can now obtain or recall. I am glad to turn this over to the Department of Archives and History. Thomas M. Owen ____ Director.

Reserving only the Georgia record of the life of Julius C. Alford in the first manuscript which I wrote several years before I knew anything of the Alabama Department of Archives and History. That first memorial of Julius C. Alford's life, I gave to my cousin Eugenia [Sanders?] who is now past 80 years [a few words illegible] she gave a copy of it to her near relative, a minister who is now dead, but I was prudent enough to keep a copy myself.

When you put the material I now send to Dr. Owen in shape for reliable keeping let me have a copy of the Alabama history of Julius C. Alford or let me have the privilege of reading it over. I will be glad to see you and Lod at any time at my home.

Benjamin B. Spratling III #263 William Wright Sullivan #646 James Alford #725 Julius was enumerated in the 1850 census of Montgomery, Alabama with son Julius S. Alford age 5 and daughter Sally L. Alford under one year.

According to Dictionary of Alabama Biography, Julius married Mrs. Martha Herrin Boswell, daughter of Henry and Sally (McClendon) Herrin and the widow of Thomas Coke Boswell. Martha was born May 19 1819 and died July 8 1880. They were married February 22 1852. Why were children listed below for this third marriage not included in the will? The fact that son Lodwick Herrin showed Margaret Boswell as his sister (probably halfsister) in the 1900 census supports this marriage. It was probably widow Martha Boswell Alford with her Boswell and Alford children enumerated in 1870 Opelika, Lee County, AL.

Eliza Ashley Cook was his first wife. They were married Mar 14 1824 in Greene County, GA. She was the daughter of Colonel George Cook and Jane Ashley. She was born Apr 25 1804 and died Jul 6 1843 in White Sulpher Springs, Meriwether County, GA. Their children were: George Cook Alford who died during the Civil War; Antoinette Lafayette Alford who married Benjamin J. Baldwin; Juliet Warren Alford who married Albert Ewing Cox and Eliza E. Alford who married Moses Austin Martin.

His second wife was Sarah F. Underwood whom he married Aug 8 1844 in Montgomery County, AL. Their children were: Julius Stanley Alford who married Caroline Judith Ellsberry and Sallie Jackson Alford who married Cadwalader H. Beale.

Julius married his third wife, Martha Herrin Boswell, on Feb 22 1852 in Montgomery County. Their children were Cecile Alford, Lodwick Herrin Alford who married (1) Sallie Swint and (2) Sallie Boswell, and Mattie Bell Alford who married Arthur R. Booth. ❖

Bethel Methodist Church Cemetery, established 2 Nov 1907

"Location: Directly behind the

church which was erected on a 'square acre' on the East side of Station Pond in the community of McRae, Clay County, FL. The historic little church was dismantled about 10 years later after founding members had died or moved. The cemetery was maintained for many years by annual work and 'clean-up' days. This effort was eventually abandoned with the passage of time. The property was acquired by private owners."

The article does not list all people buried there, probably because the dense overgrowth prevented a survey. The author gives the names of several people known to have been buried there: **Ilar (Prevatt) Alford** and her sisters Nan (Prevatt) Cooper and Florence (Prevatt) Stoddard. "Ilar Alford's family had her remains moved to a Palatka cemetery some years later."

Sources for the article, which includes 2 drawings of the church by the author, include Mrs. Lillie (Alford) McCraney, deceased, a daughter of Ilar Alford.

Following the cemetery description is a transcription of the 2 Nov 1907 deed for the acre on which the church was built. The land was deeded by S.R. Jenkins and his wife Coy Jenkins, of the county of Clay, for \$1 to trustees of the Bethel Methodist Episcopal Church.

The author noted that Paul B. Prevatt, one of the signers, and Louise, were the parents of the three Prevatt sisters buried in the cemetery, and that **Coy Jenkins** was **Coy Alford**, sister of **Bryant Alford** [presumably the husband of Ilar].

From J.H. French's Gazetteer of the State of New York, 1860

- p. 176 West Almond, Allegany Co. NY was first settled in 1816 and John ALFRED from NJ, was one of the early settlers.
- p. 253 Mrs. Gould ALVORD. The first death recorded in Little York (near Marathon, NY) was that of Mrs. Gould ALVORD.
- p. 253 The first marriage in Texas Valley, NY (near Marathon, NY) was that of Nicholas BRINK and Polly ALFRED (perhaps ALFORD). These events occurred in the late 1790's.
- p. 391 ALVORD is one of family names listed as among the early settlers of Georgetown, Madison Co., NY. The first settler arrived in 1794, and many more came in the next 2 years.
- p. 470 It is recorded that ALVORD family members were early settlers of Vernon, Oneida Co., NY in the late 1790's.
- p. 479 "The first settlers of Salina (near Syracuse, NY) came in 1790 and principally located upon the summit of the bluff above the salt springs. Most of them came with the intention of entering into the manufacture of salt. At first, kettles suspended from poles were used exclusively; but in a short time it was found more convenient to rest the kettles upon a pile of stones. The 'works' were afterward covered to protect the manu-

facturer from the weather. The first caldron kettle was used in 1793. . . . The first salt made under a permanent building was manufactured by Elisha ALVORD, as agent of the Federal Company, organized in 1798."

- p. 489 Among early settlers in "Salt Point" were Elisha ALVORD and Dioclesian ALVORD. Elisha ALVORD kept the first store in 1795. "Salt Point" later took the name of Salina, and it is located near the mouth of Onondaga Creek. The early settlers came to manufacture salt.
- p. 523 At the first village meeting of Oswego City, Oswego, NY, held May 13, 1828 George S. ALVORD was elected as one of the Aldermen.

The Spoils of World War II

American troops are usually thought of as liberators during World War II—not as common thieves. But U.S. service members were responsible for stealing hundreds of millions of dollars worth of valuables during and, especially, right after the war while they occupied German castles and other property for headquarters use, according to Alford.

Many stolen goods were shipped home or sold on the blackmarket to neighboring countries. Some of the items have been recovered; thousands have not:

U.S. troops cleaned out the famous Hungarian Gold Train containing crates of rings, watches, furs and gold that belonged to murdered Jews. They used pilfered silverware and china sets in mess halls, draperies and linens to decorate their officers' clubs, and dolls and dresses stolen from castles as bingo prizes.

Also stolen were the Hess Crown Jewels hidden in the cellar of the Kronberg Castle. Army Capt. Kathleen Nash and Army Col. Jack Durant took nine diamond-studded tiaras, a bracelet with 365 large diamonds, mother-of-pearl folding fans, platinum jewelry and a 12-carat diamond ring. The pair was convicted and sent to prison, but many of the items are still missing.





"Alfords" in Alabama SS Decedent File

By Gil Alford, Senior Associate for Alford Family Systems

he "Alfords" on the list below are from the Alabama Social Security Decedent File. The subject may have been born, registered for Social Security, or died in Alabama.

You can request a copy of a deceased person's original Social Security Application (SS-5) by writing to the address below. Include the information given for the deceased and \$7. (The fee is \$16.50 if the Social Security number is not known.)

The latest death dates shown in the SS file are 1991 but there are only about 20 in that year—1 in Alabama. Generally, the deaths are from 1941 (although the program began in 1934) through 1990. Until recently many people were not in the Social Security system. For example, self-employed persons, including farmers, were excluded for years. Military and federal civil service personnel were not in it until the 1980's. (I retired in 1981 and was never under SS except as a kid before going into service in WW II.) We also know of people who were in SS and who have died but are

not listed. We also know of a few cases in which there are errors. As with most data, researchers must take this information as a clue about where to go for further evidence.

In previous issues we have published the Social Security Decendent lists for California (Summer 1996), Missouri (Spring 1996), Louisiana (Winter 1996), Virginia and West Virginia (Summer 94), and Mississippi (June 1991 and Sept 1991). We will continue publishing state lists in future issues. If you have an urgent need for another Alford list from the Social Security Decedent file, contact AAFA.

The SS numbers used for Alabama are 416–424. Those on Rail Road Retirement had SS numbers 700–728.

EXPLANATION OF HEADINGS

- "Born or Registered" is the date and state where the decedent was either born or where he registered with SS.
- "Died" is the date and state of death.
- "Zip 1" is where the Social Security benefits were last mailed during the person's life.
- "City", if any, is based on Zip 1 and is not found in the Decedent File. AAFA added this information.
- "Zip 2" (in parentheses) is where the death benefits were mailed, indicated only if different from Zip 1.
- "RR" if used instead of a state means the person was on RailRoad Pension.

We have old marriage printouts that were marked up and new marriage printouts that were printed after the corrections were input. We need someone to compare one with the other to see if all corrections actually were input—another little job that can be done by someone without a computer.

Obtaining an Authentic Coat of Arms

n the second issue of AAFA ACTION, September 1988, we printed an article, "The AAFA Badge," that described the origins of the badge that appears on the front of AAFA ACTION. Designer Jim Haynsworth of Columbia, SC, researched the use of badges as well as various Alford coats of arms in order to incorporate the most common elements of Alford heraldry into our Association badge. Josiah Alford's Alford Family Notes contains illustrations of eight historical Alford coats of arms which were included in "The AAFA Badge." However, unless you can prove direct descent from the person to whom a coat of arms was originally issued, you can't legitimately display it. However, if you've always wanted to display Armorial Bearings that you could legitimately claim as your own, you might, with patience and some substantial research, be able to realize that dream.

Lodwick Alford, AAFA President and Chairman of the Board Emeritus, came across an article describing the process of obtaining authentic arms in one of the genealogical publications to which he subscribes, *The High Family Journal* (P.O. Box 5841, Columbia, SC 28250—issued twice yearly at no charge to Highs and High descendants). Thinking that many AAFA members would be interested, he obtained permission from the author to reprint the article in *AAFA ACTION*.

In the January 1991 issue of *The High Family Journal*, author/editor Lake E. High, Jr., asked the question "Is there a legitimate High coat of arms?" After waiting a year and not hearing from anyone, he checked it out himself. What he found was that no High had ever been issued Armorial Bearings (as "coats of arms" are properly termed). What follows is the fascinating, somewhat abbreviated account of Lake

High's successful 1994 acquisition of legitimate Armorial Bearings, taken from the *Journal* cited below.

My Coat of Arms

By Lake E. High, Jr.

When my wife, Margot, and I were last in England we saw a computerized setup in the gift shop of Westminster Abbey that would allow one, for a few dollars, to enter one's surname and it would give you a copy of the supposed origins of your name along with some computer drawn coat of arms.

The affable young entrepreneur who had the computer approached us and asked us to give it a go. I told him that I didn't think he would have my surname in his computer bank since it was so rare. Looking for the sale, he did a search anyway and came up empty handed just as I suspected.... He was out of a sale, but he was a friendly chap who chatted with us ... and let us look at some of the "scrolls" he printed up. Looking over some of his printouts I could see the paragraphs dealing with coats of arms were very general and came complete with a disclaimer....

In the United States there is no heraldic authority to enforce the rightful bearing of Arms as in England where it is controlled by the Court of the College of Arms. Since there is no legal authority to enforce the correct use of arms here, there is hardly ever any disclaimer presented when one gets "a coat of arms." That lack of enforcement, plus the United States having no official heraldry, has led to a woeful lack of knowledge of heraldry by Americans. Despite the fact that millions of middle and upper class

American have a "coat of arms" framed and hanging somewhere in their house, the number who have legitimate arms displayed can be counted in the hundreds, or at most, in the few thousands.

First of all, there is no such thing as a "family coat of arms." All arms are issued to one person only. Arms are how that one person represents himself to the world in a heraldic way.

This most common misunderstanding of "family arms" has arisen because a man's Armorial Bearings are inherited by his sons and daughters so more than one person does use them. Arms and their proper display work like an inheritance. My son can display my Arms if he properly differentiates his from mine with a small symbol added to the shield that is called a sign of cadence. Since my son will one day inherit my Arms, he can display them as his own during his lifetime with that sign of cadence and when I die he should display his Arms with the mark of cadence removed.

All of a father's sons will inherit their father's Arms and all of their sons inherit from their father and so on forever. That way, after several generations, one person's Armorial Bearing can be used and displayed by multiple people in many families of the same surname. But, regardless of how many descendants the Armiger has, those particular Arms can not be claimed by anyone who does not directly descend from the original Armiger. (An Armiger is a person who possesses arms.)

When one orders a "coat of arms" from out of a magazine, or from an artist, it may be a good show of family pride, but it is bad heraldry.... You can tell the fraudulent from the real at a glance, however.... The genuine Letters Patent

contains a painting of the total achievement along with the wording of the warrants as stated by the issuing authority. (The "achievement" is the full display of legitimate arms. In the U. S. we tend to call it a "family crest," but that is incorrect.) Another way to tell the genuine from the fake is to read the wording. That way you can see who the issuing authority is. Unless the issuing authority is the Garter King of Arms in London, or the Lord Lyon King of Arms in Scotland or from Belgium, Spain or South Africa, the Arms are generally not legitimate....

The Garter King of Arms in England and the Lord Lyon King of Arms in Scotland, will issue Arms to Americans who can prove descent in the male line from a male who was under English rule in the colonies.

In other words, since I descend from Thomas High who was in Virginia, under English rule from 1662 through 1688, and since I can prove my descent in a male line, I am eligible to receive English Arms. Indeed, I did not have to prove my descent all the way back to Thomas.... I did so even though it was not strictly necessary. I wanted my entire line to be on record since all Arms issued by the College of Arms in England are recorded along with a chart showing the line of descent.

It turns out that getting Armorial Bearings from England is no easy thing. Not only did I have to prove my descent with a document between each generation, but they were very particular about what documents they would accept. No secondary sources were allowed as proof. That is, no books were allowed except as corroborating evidence. Only primary sources—legal documents-were accepted. They also had to pass on my "biography." I had to submit a short history of myself with a list of my degrees and accomplishments. It took almost three years of writing back and forth to England and sending additional documents

before we got to the place where they agreed to issue Arms.

Then there was the designing of the Arms.... The Herald who is designing the Arms will ask for suggestions and the newly created Armiger has the last say in the design of his Arms.... [After several exchanges with the Herald, a design was finally agreed upon and the Honorary Arms were issued.]

I'm very proud of my Arms and I worked hard to get them. I am the first High to ever bear arms. But my son and his descendants, forever, can use my Arms and my daughters can display them as their own. They are recorded in the College of Arms in London and in England the proper use of them can be enforced. In America, unfortunately, the proper use of them can not be enforced. However, no other High who is not my direct descendant is entitled to use my Armorial Bearings. In other words, my Arms are not "the High family arms" to be used by other Highs.

But, the good news is any male High who is a descendant of Thomas High who can prove his descent and who is acceptable to the Earl Marshall of England can request his own personal arms. It is a long process, but I suggest it to Highs who are interested in their family history and who admire the art of heraldry. It is an opportunity to do something for your family that will last forever.

NOTE from Mr. High: The address of The College of Arms is—

The College of Arms Queen Victoria Street London EC4, England

All you need to send is a simple letter that says, "I am requesting a Grant of Arms, or Honorary Armorial Bearing. Please let me know what I must do to fultill the requirements." You can expect an answer in about two weeks. Good luck! •

Barrows Book

Robert S. Barrows of Rochester, NY, AAFA #178, recently published *The Descendants of Asenath (Vaill) and Freeman Barrows*. The 300+ page book details all the descendants of his paternal great-grandfather, Freeman Barrows of Missouri and traces many family lines back to their immigrant ancestors. An appendix describes family heirlooms and how the families traveled from New England to the West.

The Alford connection is that his grandfather's sister, Florence Barrows, married Robert M. Alford in Missouri.

This is the last book in his series documenting all the descendants of his four great-grandfathers. When his mother died, Bob was unsure who his cousins were, so set about to outline them. During the past 20 years he has published those family histories, plus four other books on family events.

This softcover book was published privately with 200 copies printed. Bob gathered material for several years by writing to cousins, who contacted their close cousins and gave the material to Bob. Susan Laubengayer, AAFA #647, was a major contributor of Alford data and did a great job of researching her MO and VA ancestors.

Bob says the process of publishing a book is relatively easy, and all genealogists should frequently publish their findings, even in modest, preliminary form, and distribute to their family. This serves three functions: It disciplines the researcher into a logical organization of the work; the compiler obtains prompt feedback; and it may stimulate others into action.

Bob's first two family histories were made on an electric typewriter, so you don't even need a computer—but that surely helps. Publishing a book is easy—the hard part is getting good data! ❖

Walter Hulbert Alford, 1876–1929

In 1994 Truman Alford, AAFA #005, sent a photo of an Alford Park in Kenosha, WI. For information on the origin on the name, Editor Pam Thompson contacted the Kenosha Public Library, which generously sent newspaper article copies, brochures, and other material related to one of their most prominent citizens, Walter H. Alford. Gil Alford also had information from the Kenosha County Historical Museum. Thanks to Ruth McNinch for combining these sources into the following article.

From AAFA files, source unknown:

alter Hulbert Alford (all'ford), business executive, was born at Rice, Tex., Oct. 4, 1876, son of Albert N. and Sarah Cornelia (Coleman) Alford. His father was a landowner in Houston County, Tex., a captain in the Confederate Army during the Civil War and a Texas Ranger. [Efforts to prove his being a Texas Ranger have failed.] The son attended school at Rice and at Willspoint, Tex. For some years he was in the hardware business at the latter place.

Subsequently he moved to St. Louis, Mo., where until 1910 he was an accountant with the Laclede Gas Co. He then became assistant comptroller with the General Motors Co. in Detroit and during 1914–16 was comptroller of that company. In 1916, when Charles W. Nash organized the Nash Motor Co. and purchased the plant of the Thomas B. Jeffery Motor Co. at Kenosha, Wis., Alford removed to that city and became the vice-president, comptroller and director of the Nash Company, which offices he held until his death.

During the years he lived at Kenosha he was identified with almost every civic movement in the community. For five years he was president of the city council. Shortly before his death he completed plans to build a \$300,000 business block in order to provide work for the unemployed. His philanthropies were known throughout Wisconsin, his benefactions totaling more than \$1,000,000, among them being donations of \$100,000 to the Kenosha Y.M.C.A. and \$400,000 to religious building enterprises. He was a member of the Masonic Order and the Elks Club. A kind and tolerant man, he was much loved and esteemed by all who knew him—business leaders and working men alike. His religious affiliation was with the Church of the Disciples of Christ. In politics he was a Democrat.

He was married in Louisville, Ky., Feb. 10, 1910, to Gertrude Marie, daughter of Manuel Sylvester Pereda y Gordon, a sugar plantation owner, of Cuba, and they had a son, Ferrin Hulbert Alford. He died at Kenosha.

AAFA NOTES: Walter's grandfather was George G. Alford, born June 17, 1793 in Cayuga, Seneca County, New York. His grandmother was George's second wife, Ann Barfield. George Alford moved from New York to Michigan to New Madrid, Missouri. From Missouri he went to Texas and joined in the fight for Texas independence. He was Sam Houston's quartermaster general. His likeness is included in a mural of the surrender to Sam Houston in the rotunda of the Texas State Capitol. Walter was a desecndant of Benedict Alford who immigrated to Boston in the early 1630's. On the margin of a photograph coming from the Kenosha County Historical Museum were the following notes: b. 4 Oct. 1876 at Chitfield, TX. Lived in Willsfield, TX His grandfather, Gen. Alford was a pioneer of Willsfield. W.H. Alford died in 1929 of a heart attack at Kenosha, WI. Wife's name was Gertrude. Son Ferrin d. at 18 yrs in a auto accident, 12/28/28. W.H. Alford was an admired man, always called "Judge" Alford. He and his wife were very generous to the city of Kenosha. The lovely home where they lived is now Kenosha Historical Society and the beautiful home across the street the home of the International Barbershop Quartet. It was designed by Mr. Alford in the English Tudor style with windows of cut stained glass coats of arms etc. W.H. Alford died before it was completed. His wife did move to the home when it was completed. Kenosha also has an Alford Park along Lake Michigan. We would have liked to have claimed Judge Alford as a direct relative.

All Kenosha Mourns Death of W.H. Alford as Funeral is Planned

City to Pay Wide Tribute to His Memory

Messages of Condolence Received from Far and Near, Honoring Dead Leader

All Kenosha, mourning today the death of Walter H. Alford, civic and industrial leader, who died Wednesday afternoon at his home, 6036 Eighth

Avenue, planned to pay tribute to his memory during the time of the funeral services Friday afternoon.

This tribute will take the form of cessation of all business and industry as a token of their respect in which he was held throughout the community.

The funeral services, which are to be marked by simplicity in keeping with his desires, will be held at the late home at two o'clock Friday afternoon. The Reverend Kenneth D. Martin, rector of St. Matthew's Episcopal church, of which Mr. Alford was a member, will officiate. Interment will follow in the family plot in the Green Ridge cemetery.

Messages of Condolence

Messages of condolence came to Kenosha from far and near today, expressing regret at his death and stating the loss which this and other communities suffer in his death. One of the messages was from Governor Walter J. Kohler, many were from leaders of finance and industry from all parts of the nation, some were from his boyhood home in Texas.

Kenoshans also joined in expressing their sympathy and their loss.

In token of the great service which he had rendered the city as a public official, the flag was at half mast at the city hall today and will remain so until after the funeral services on Friday.

Nash Plant to Close

Announcement was made today that all Nash Motors company plants will be closed Friday and Saturday as a tribute to his memory. Other manufacturing plants in the city will cease activities during the funeral services.

The Alford home, where Mr. Alford lies in state, has been opened to the public for all who wish to pay a

personal respect to his memory. It was announced that there would be no special time but that the friends might come at any time today or Friday before the funeral.

Mr. Alford died at 2:45 Wednesday afternoon being unable in his weakened condition to rally from a relapse which had come only a short time before. He had been critically ill since last Friday.

Was Great Civic Leader

Judge Alford, as he was affectionately known throughout Kenosha, came to this city in 1916. He was a native of Texas and had spent his boyhood and young manhood in that state.

Later he became comptroller of the LaClare [sic—LaClede] Gas and Light company of St. Louis, his success there winning the attention of the General Motors company, of which he became the comptroller in 1911. In 1916 at the organization of the Nash Motors company, he came to this city as vice-president and comptroller of that company, which position he has since held.

In 1922 he was elected a member of the new city manager city council of Kenosha and for three terms he served as president of that body. Development of major city improvements, establishing of city zoning, advancement of parks and carrying out of a city plan marked the advance of the city under his guidance during those periods.

In Many Civic Movements

He was identified with virtually every civic movement in Kenosha during those years, also aiding many in private business. In philanthropies he had given widely both for the public and for individuals.

He was a director of the First National bank and the Brown National bank of

Kenosha, of the First National bank and of the Union Trust company of Chicago.

He was identified with many of the fraternal organizations of Kenosha among them being the Masonic orders and the Kenosha Lodge of Elks.

The parts which he had played in guiding the destinies of the city, in directing the financial affairs of Wisconsin's largest industry, in aiding in various other business and financial ventures and his personal generosity to individuals and philanthropic organizations had won for him almost a legendary name throughout the city and state, all of these being reflected in the various tributes paid to his memory today.

Gov. Kohler in Tribute

Madison, Wis.—(U.P.)—Gov. Walter J. Kohler today sent the following message of condolence to Mrs. Walter H. Alford, Kenosha, widow of the former vice president of Nash Motors company:

"Mrs. Kohler and I are greatly distressed at the death of your distinguished husband and my old friend. His kindliness and helpfulness to those in need, as well as his strong sense of public responsibility, endeared him to thousands. His loss will be felt not only in Kenosha, but throughout the state and nation. We mourn with you at his untimely passing".

In another message to C.W. Nash, Governor Kohler declared:

"I am greatly shocked to learn of the death of your vice president, Walter H. Alford. His strong sense of civic duty and his outstanding business ability made him one of Wisconsin's leading citizens and he will be sorely missed."

Active in Many Achievements for City, State

W.H. Alford Was Outstanding Citizen in Civic Leadership, Philanthropy

A man of widespread interest and equally diversified activities associated with all ranks of men from the laborer in the foundry to the financial wizards of Wall Street was Walter H. Alford, whose death Wednesday afternoon left the entire state of Wisconsin mourning the loss of one of its most useful citizens.

His character brought him more friends perhaps than any other man in Kenosha, and his philanthropies, quiet and unassuming, endeared him in the hearts of thousands who benefitted by his kindness.

To enumerate some of these acts of financial generosity to his fellow men was impossible, his friends said today. Many of these were done under cover of secrecy, and under pledges of confidence, and these ran into thousands of dollars. The satisfaction of helping out his fellow citizens in their greatest time of need was to Mr. Alford his greatest joy.

Active in Many Things

The life of devotion that he had given to his family, disrupted by the untimely death of his only child, Ferrin Alford, in 1928, continued in many ways in the civic channels of his community.

With outspoken faith in the future of the community Mr. Alford had laid his life plans in Kenosha. There was not a movement of any kind in the community that involved the betterment of either a few or a large number of its citizens that did not touch Mr. Alford.

He gave liberally to building campaigns; his name heads the list of many church funds. The Y.M.C.A., Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts, the Salvation Army, the Community Chest, church organizations of every denomination, Protestant, Catholic, and Jewish—all found him a ready giver. He was intimately interested in the state Citizens Military Training camp association, of which he was a director; he was a life member of the Wisconsin Association for the Disabled, an organization interested in crippled children.

Aided Park Development

With others he saw into the future when Kenosha would appreciate extensive lake shore park lands and purchased large areas of lake frontage to be held until such time as the city could afford to purchase it. Then he sold his interest to the city without profit. Now the coming generations will find parks along the beach, instead of commercial developments.

It did not take long to convince Mr. Alford of the merits of a community project. If it would do anyone good he was willing to give his support. And that meant more than just moral support. Many a home in Kenosha has brightened and become prosperous because of Mr. Alford's interest. Many a family man who has been out of work and whose family was in destitute circumstances owes his job to the vice president of the company. A job was just "made" for that man.

His financial genius brought him the reputation in the business world as "the little financial wizard." To him is generally attributed the soundness and stability of the company which he helped organize in Kenosha thirteen years ago.

Wizard of the Council

To him also is attributed much of the financial success of the city council during the seven years that he was president. Elected always with the greatest vote of public confidence ever given a Kenosha citizen in any office, his great contribution to municipal government was his wise leadership that always seemed so sensibly adequate. In spite of his many business activities when he was president of the council there was always time to talk to anyone who came to see him about city matters. And the decisions and advice invariable meant improvement and betterment.

He carried this same business sagacity into his association with other men in other enterprises. When Kenosha appeared certain to lose the prospect of landing a new industry because the business men of the city couldn't raise a fund of \$150,000 as a loan to the company seeking the location, Mr. Alford offered his personal check in that amount, and the company came to Kenosha. As a result 250 more people will find employment when the factory is completed.

Realizing the seriousness of the unemployment situation in Kenosha lately Mr. Alford ordered pushed with haste plans for a \$200,000 business development which was to be erected on his property at Fifty-eighth street and Seventh avenue in order that large numbers of men could be given work on the project.

And now on Third avenue, nearing completion, is the beautiful Alford home. Built in the hope that it might be a joy in the heart of his son, then built as a memorial to his memory, the home now stands out as another evidence of his faith in the community.

While there are hundreds of other manifestations of the kindly hand of Mr. Alford, and while there are many that will never be publicly recorded, these are among those that will be uppermost in the minds of a mournful and mindful public that will watch the cortege carry the man to his final resting place Friday afternoon.

Walter Alford—Best Friend and Benefactor

The article about Petrifying Springs Park brought a generous response and some additional information. The name of Mr. Walter Alford was linked to the park land, for it was due to his generosity in advancing the money that the county could pay owners for the land. If it hadn't been for him, we might never have acquired the Fox River Park and Petrifying Springs Park.

Mr. Alford, one of the most beneficent citizens Kenosha has ever had, was born in Chitfield, Texas, on October 4, 1876, the grandson of General Alford, a pioneer. After boyhood days in Texas, he went to St. Louis to work. Before long he was Comptroller of LaClare [sic—LaClede] Gas and Light Company. In 1911—when 35—he was obtained by General Motors in Detroit as its Comptroller. When Nash Motors was organized in 1916, he came to Kenosha as Vice-President and Comptroller, a position he held until his death. He was also on the board of directors of the First National Bank of Kenosha, of the Brown National Bank of Kenosha, of the First National Bank of Chicago, and of the First Union Trust Company of Chicago.

No account of his career would be fair to him if some record of his kindnesses were not included. Always interested in people, he was a leader in hospital work, gave to parks and other public works, gave to many societies and churches in need of funds, donated Alford Lodge at Dyer Lake for a boys' camp. He was a member of the first civic council under the city manager plan and presided as president for three terms, retiring in 1928 because of failing health.

Also in 1928—on December 29—his only son was one of five young people killed by a southbound Northwestern passenger train at the Sheridan Road crossing before the railroad was elevated. A northbound freight had just passed before the cars crossed, but two cars were struck by the fast train on the other track. The memory of that night is too painful to recall even today. Ferrin Alford was only sixteen.

Mr. and Mrs. Alford were still living at 6036 Eighth Avenue when Mr. Alford died on February 5, 1930. The new house at 6315 Third Avenue wasn't ready for occupancy.

Simple funeral services conducted by Rev. Kenneth Martin were held at the Alford home. The pall-bearers were all department heads: C.P. Heide, Lawrence Holly, Harold Long, Hans Luthi, Horace Mellum, P.J. Moohan, Harold Salisbury, and L.L. Virgil. Burial was in Green Ridge Cemetery. Gov. and Mrs. Walter Kohler came to honor his memory. On the day of his funeral all business and industry stopped during the afternoon. Nash Motors plants were closed for two more days in tribute. The Kenosha News gave unprecedented space for three days-column after column of tributes. Mr. George S. Whyte said he was "the finest type of Southern gentlemen" — "one of the cheeriest dispositions" — "An inspiration to talk with him" — "keen sense of humor, delighted to exchange stories" -- "to know him was to love him" — "gave freely of his time and talents."

Mr. Pettit, then vice-president of Nash Motors, characterized him as "possessed of high courage, a fine mind, absolute integrity, and a rare capacity to reciprocate gratitude and affection."

Attorney C.E. Randall said he was "the confidant of people in every walk of life" — "His confidence and faith in Kenosha was unlimited" — "His gentle ways, his thoughtfulness, his benefactions brought respect, love and reverence from everyone."

Friends said that it was impossible to enumerate his benefactions; many were done in secrecy and under pledges of confidence. His influence in preserving certain park lands has been mentioned above, but he also purchased large areas of lake frontage (including Alford Park) until such time as the city could purchase it. Then he sold his interest to the city without a penny of profit.

.... Usually we take extravagant eulogies with a grain of salt, but Mr. Alford deserved the utterly sincere tributes. It is interesting to note that he was a life member of the Wisconsin Association for the Disabled, an organization interested in crippled children. He too had been a crippled child and was handicapped throughout his life, short in stature and hunchbacked. What blessings he brought to all who knew him—and to us who are living now! Even today friends become misty-eyed and say, "He shouldn't have died so young-only 53 years old."

If we should read the 44th chapter of Ecclesiasticus (in the Apocrypha), we would agree that many of the fine descriptions were true of Mr. Walter Alford. What if each of us lived up to his potential!!

HISTORIC KENOSHA, THE THIRD AVENUE DISTRICT

Built for \$350,000 between 1928 and 1930, this fine Tudor Revival house is a red brick, two and one-half story building with a slate tile gable roof. The entry pavilion is constructed of stone and topped with battlements. The tudor-arched entrance is decorated with stone label molding and a stone surround; above the entrance is an oriel window trimmed in stone. Multipaned, casement-type window are decorated with label moldings and

tabbed stone surrounds. There is a twostory tower section at the northwest corner of the main block of the house....

Walter H. Alford was vice-president of the Nash Motor Company when he began construction on the home. He was President of the city council and promoted the 1925 city plan that brought about the development of the Civic Center concept. Currently, the house is headquarters of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America, Inc. •

The National Archives and Records Administration (NARA) has announced a new pilot online service called the NARA ARCHIVAL INFORMATION LOCATOR (NAIL). The following is from the NARA announcement:

"NAIL, funded through the support of Senator Bob Kerrey of Nebraska, is an online, interactive database available via the World Wide Web. It provides unprecedented access to NARA's vast holdings; users with access to the Internet can now search many descriptions of NARA's holdings online for key words or topics, and then can retrieve digital copies of textual documents, photographs, maps and sound recordings. Hypertext links connect series descriptions.

"NAIL contains a great deal of information about a wide variety of NARA's holdings. Initially focused on audiovisual material, NAIL contains descriptions of 2,500 still picture series and 20,000 still picture items; 85,000 films and videos; and 8,500 sound recordings. Select sound files and about 1,000 photographs, many of them digitized in a partnership with the University of Nebraska press, are online. Many descriptions and select sample documents relate to the American West...."

FIVE CIVILIZED TRIBES **RECORDS**

Title: Applications for Enrollment in the Five Civilized Tribes

Dates 1898-1914

Scope & Content: Commonly called the Commission to the Five Civilized Tribes, the Dawes Commission was appointed by President Grover Cleveland in 1893 to negotiate with the Cherokee, Creek, Choctaw, Chickasaw and Seminole tribes. In return for abolishing their tribal governments and recognizing state and federal laws, tribe members were allotted a share of common property.

Heads of families, orphans, and children could receive 40 to 160 acres of land by proving their tribal membership. This series contains the original applications for tribal enrollments under the act of June 28, 1898, as well as supporting documents such as birth and death affidavits, marriage licenses, transcripts of testimony taken by the Commission, correspondence relating to the status of the application, and decisions and orders of the Commission.

Isaac Alford & Family

Isaac W. Alford was born in Franklin County, North Carolina on November 14, 1805. Alford and his father-in-law, Hickman Williams, loaded their belongings on a covered wagon and set out across the mountains to establish a new home.

Settlers had been pouring west in great numbers for several years. Tennessee became the 16th state in 1796, and since that time the population had increased quickly. In 1816, settlers bound for southern Middle Tennessee received a big lift when Major General Andrew Jackson signed a treaty with the Chickasaw Indians that ceded all of the land north and east of the Tennessee River to the United States and to Tennessee.

This was the kind of frontier environment where young Isaac Alford grew to manhood. We assume that he went through most of the trials and tribulations the other early settlers of the county were faced with. He became the kind of man who would leave the world a better place to live, the kind of man who would help to build a community out of a wilderness. He did no more than thousands of hardy pioneers would do during the 19th Century, but through their combined efforts, we can enjoy living in the greatest nation in the history of the world. Isaac Alford, and the other pioneers, gave us our heritage. A heritage we are all proud of.

As a young man, Isaac Alford fell in love with 19 year old Mary Edmiston. They were married on July 26, 1831 and began the chore of building a life for themselves in the Middle Tennessee wilderness.

Ten children were born to this union. They were; James Madden Alford (1832), Nancy Jane (1834), Isabella (1836), Joseph Harrison (1837), Robert Newton (1839), Thomas B. (1842), William P. (1844), Mary Etta, known as Molly, (1845), Margaret Elizabeth (1848) and Sarah (1851). A large family was an advantage in the primitive agrarian society of early Lawrence County. Isaac's mother, Nancy Williams Alford, moved in with the growing family prior to 1840.

Isaac Alford took an active part in the religious and political life of the community in which he lived. He was proud of Lawrenceburg and Lawrence County and contributed to its betterment in many ways. In addition to farming, Isaac owned and operated a general merchandise store on the Public Square in Lawrenceburg. When the City of Lawrenceburg was established in 1824, lots around the square were numbered from one to 16. The records show that on April 25, 1834, Isaac W. Alford purchased Lot 11 from his brother-in-law, William A. Edmiston. On the same day, he purchased Lot 20 from Edmiston. Today, Lot 20 contains a parking lot and a service station.

The Lawrenceburg Academist, the county's first newspaper, lists under the heading; "General Merchandise Stores—Alford and Harwell, West Side of the Public Square." The paper was dated 1846.

During the 1840's and 1850's, Isaac Alford became one of the largest landowners in Lawrence County. In the 1850 Census of Lawrence County, he was listed among the top 25 property owners in the county. In addition to his home place on the Middle Fork of Shoal Creek and his store, Isaac owned a farm on the head waters of Weakley Creek. During that period, Isaac bought several lots in Lawrenceburg and hundreds of acres in rural Lawrence County.

Isaac Alford was also a slave owner during those pre Civil War days. The most notable slave he owned was an old black lady by the name of Dorcas, who became a fixture in the Alford home until her death in the 1870's.

STATE OF TENNESSEE) LAWRENCE COUNTY)

Know all men by those present that William C. Hicks, for the consideration of \$84.00 in hand paid, have this day bargained and sold unto Isaac W. Alford, a certain Negro woman slave for life. Named Dorcas, about 50 years of age, the title of which I warrant and defend unto the same Isaac W. Alford and his heirs and assigns for ever, from every and any other person or persons whatsoever. Witness my hand and seal, this 8th day of September. 1842.

TEST: Isaac W. Alford William C. Hicks James E. Edmiston

Isaac Alford was a Democrat and was actively involved in the affairs of the party. In 1846, he served as Secretary of the Lawrence County Democrat Party and was a strong supporter of James Knox Polk for President of the United States. He served as Circuit Court Clerk and as County Coroner for short times in the 1840's.

In 1848, Isaac Alford was elected to the position of Lawrence County Trustee, a position he held until his death in 1859. Isaac and his family were members of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church and attended church at Mt. Ararat, where he was one of the founders of the church.

In 1852, the Lawrence County
Quarterly Court appointed Isaac Alford
as one of the Trustees of Jackson
Academy in Lawrenceburg. This
school was located on the north side of
Waterloo Street. The trustees later built
a new brick school on what became
known as "Academy Hill" at the
intersection of Taylor and Spring
Streets in Lawrenceburg. Jackson
Academy was destroyed by fire in the
1890's and was not rebuilt. In the
1840's and 1850's it was one of the
best educational institutions in the
entire area and the school in which

most of the founding fathers of Lawrence County received their education.

Another mention of Isaac Alford as an influential citizen of Lawrence County deals with a committee appointed by the court to make a report about building a road in the county. This was the usual procedure for road building in our early history:

Lawrence County Court December, 1854 Term

"At the December 1854 term of the Lawrence County Court a committee of men composed of Allen Vick, Isaac W. Alford, S.H. Edmiston, John Kennedy, Thomas Ramos and S.M. Wasson was appointed to view a road from the three mile post on the Newburg Road through by John Chaffin's to intersect with the Waynesboro Road and to report to the next term of court."

Isaac Alford served as administrator for the estate of his mother-in-law, Winna Williams, in 1851 when her children were trying to get a continuance of her husband's Revolutionary War pension for the estate. He was also the administrator for the estate of his brother, William M. Alford, in 1847 after his death at the Battle of Monterrey during the Mexican War.

Isaac Alford died on November 23, 1859 at the young age of 53. He was replaced as Trustee by Thomas H. Paine, who would later become the first Tennessee Commissioner of Schools.

Isaac's oldest son, James Madden Alford, sold the store and settled his father's estate. The settlement included over thirteen pages with approximately 430 notes due the estate. At that time, Isaac's wife, as administrator, listed his inventory of property.

Mary Edmiston Alford and her family were left in good financial condition.

She continued to operate the family farm until her death in 1876 at the age of 64. The letter below, found in the Lawrence County Archives, tells about the county's commitment to her needs:

We the undersigned, citizens of Lawrence County, having been appointed by the December 1859 court to set apart to Mary P. Alford, widow of Isaac W. Alford, deceased, as much of the crop and provisions on hand as in our judgment will be sufficient to support her and her family for one year after the death of her husband. We set apart to her for said purpose the following articles, to wit, 100 barrels of corn, 200 hundred pounds of pork, 40 bushels of wheat, eight bushels of salt, \$50.00 for sugar, coffee, molasses, pepper, spices, \$225.00 for clothing, and 2,500 bundles of fodder. This the 9th Day of December 1859.

An important member of the Alford household during the middle years of the 19th Century was an old black lady by the name of "Dorcas." She became a member of the Alford household on September 8, 1842 when Isaac Alford bought her from his brother-in-law, William C. Hicks, for \$84.00. At that time Dorcas was approximately 50 years old.

Most of the slave trade in Tennessee during the first half of the 19th Century took place in the flat, level lands of West Tennessee. In Middle Tennessee, Lawrence was not one of the leading slave holding counties. This factor accounts for the very small black population in Lawrence County today. The land was not suitable for the large cotton plantations that dotted most of the central south in pre-Civil War days. Consequently, most of the slaves in Lawrence County were primarily used as house servants or for

odd jobs on the farm.

Isaac W. Alford bought the middle aged Dorcas as a housekeeper for his growing family. Isaac was not a large slave holder, although records show that he bought and sold slaves other than Dorcas during his lifetime.

Dorcas is not mentioned again until twenty years after her purchase. This was in 1862 during the Civil War and after Middle Tennessee had been overrun by Federal troops. Robert Newton Alford, son of Isaac and Mary Alford, was three years old when his father purchased Dorcas.

He had been one of those who escaped from Fort Donelson when the rest of his 3rd Tennessee Infantry Regiment had been captured. While home, Robert was planning to marry his first cousin, Martha Ann Edmiston. The wedding date had been set for July 24, 1862.

The wedding was to take place at his mother's home in Flatwoods. The day arrived and everything was in readiness for a big, happy wedding. All kinds of good food was prepared for the wedding feast; the guests were there, the preacher had arrived and the ceremony was about to begin.

Suddenly, Yankee soldiers were spotted coming down the lane toward the Alford home. The kitchen and pantry had a floor made with 18 inch boards and as the soldiers approached the home, Dorcas ripped up the boards and hid the groom and the preacher under the floor. The soldiers came into the house, looked around, helped themselves to the food and left. When it was safe, Dorcas lifted the boards and brought Robert Newton Alford and the preacher out of their hiding place and the wedding continued on schedule

The only other mention of Dorcas is found in the 1870 Census of Lawrence

County. She was listed as a "house servant" in the household of Mary P. Alford. This was five years after the Civil War and all slaves had been freed. Dorcas had apparently elected to remain with the Alford family. This shows that the family and Dorcas had mutual respect and love for each other and that she is a very definite part of the Alford heritage in Lawrence County. The 1870 Census shows her to be 70 years old, but many of the ages given to the census taker are in error. According to the Bill of Sale for Dorcas when Isaac Alford bought her in 1842 she was much closer to 80 years of age. At that age, you can be sure she was no longer able to do much useful work and was truly a member of the family.

The reason Hicks sold Dorcas in 1842 was because he and his family were moving to Indiana where slaves were not legal.

Isaac W. Alford's part in the Lawrence County Democrat Party

Isaac W. Alford was an active participant in Democrat Party politics in Lawrence County during the 1840's and 1850's. In addition to serving as Circuit Court Clerk, County Coroner and Trustee for the last ten years of his life, he also served as Secretary to the Democrat Party in the county. The article below appeared in the *Lawrenceburg Times* on March 4, 1847, and concerns the Lawrence County Democrat Convention that year:

LAWRENCEBURG TIMES, March 4, 1847

At a meeting of the democracy of Lawrence County in the courthouse in Lawrenceburg on the first day of March, 1847, Major William B. Hall was called to the chair, and Isaac Alford appointed secretary. The chair stated one object of the meeting to be to take measures to secure the prompt and harmonious action of the Democrats of the county, in the approaching election.

RESOLVED, that each civil district is hereby requested to appoint delegates to meet the delegates from other counties in this congressional and senatorial district, at this place on the 5th Monday of this month to nominate a candidate for Congress, and one for State Senator.

RESOLVED, that in the opinion of this meeting, this county has claims for the senator in this Senatorial district, and we therefore recommend to the favorable consideration of the convention the name of Dr. William P. Rowles.

RESOLVED, that the several districts in the county are hereby requested to appoint delegates to meet at this place, on the 1st Monday in May next, to nominate a candidate to represent this county in the next legislature.

RESOLVED, that although several of the questions formerly dividing the country, have ceased to afford grounds of difference, the present position of our opponents call upon every citizen who prefers to advance the true glory and interest of the country, to that of a party of its leaders, to be vigilant.

RESOLVED, that those of our citizens, in and out of office, or elsewhere, who oppose the vigorous prosecution of the existing war with Mexico, or who stigmatise the war as unjust are unnecessary, are neither entitled to the respect or confidence of the country.

RESOLVED, that in time of war, the Democrat Party has ever stood and will ever stand by our country when right, they stand by her when wrong; and whether right or wrong.

RESOLVED, that the expulsion of the

conductor of a public journal from the reporter's seats in the Senate of the United States was, in the judgment of this meeting, an attack on the Freedom of the Press, and so far as the vote of the majority of that body goes, an abrogation of the constitution, which deserved, and to which we give our unqualified reprehension, because the freedom of the press, and the freedom of debate, are the only means by which the people can know which men and principles deserve their support.

RESOLVED, that a copy of these proceedings be sent to Thomas Richie, and that he be requested to 'cry aloud and spare not' any of the luke warm friends or hidden enemies of the Republic.

RESOLVED, that in the approaching elections, we earnestly request all candidates to take the fairest means of preserving strength and harmony of action.

RESOLVED, that the proceeding of this meeting be published in the "Lawrenceburg Times," "Columbia Beacon" and "Nashville Union." SIGNED:

W.B. Hall, Chairman Isaac W. Alford, Secretary

During the following election campaign, George Henry Nixon, hero of the Battle of Monterrey, was a candidate for Direct Representative from Lawrence County to the Tennessee General Assembly. There seems to have been some questions about where Nixon stood on the issues of the day. At any rate, he wrote an open letter concerning his stand on the issues. It was published in the *Lawrenceburg Times* on June 14, 1847.

GENTLEMEN: I have the honor of receiving your note today, asking an expression of my opinion in relation to the political questions of the day. First, I am in favor of the present administration. Second, I am in favor of the

War with Mexico, I am opposed to the National Bank, I am opposed to a high and excise tariff, I am in favor of an Independent Treasury; I am not for changing the Constitution and I am for a strict construction of the same.

Eley Alford & His Family

Eley (Eli) Harrison Alford was born in Lawrence County, Tennessee on December 29, 1820. He was the son of Ira Bailey and Nancy Williams Alford. On September 5, 1844, he married Elizabeth Hannah, the daughter of John Hannah. They settled in the Crawfish Valley community of Lawrence County. Eley and Elizabeth Alford had eight children.

Eley Alford is mentioned on numerous occasions in the early records of Lawrence County. He is listed as being on road work details, being on the jury, and as being active in the affairs of the Democrat Party.

In 1869, Eley and Elizabeth Hannah Alford were listed among the heirs of John Hannah. Eli and his family were listed in the 1850, 1860 and 1870 Census of Lawrence County. His son, William H., is listed in the 1880 Census. Eley moved to Marshall County, Tennessee sometime after 1875. His oldest daughter, Chesina Jane [sic—should be Chirena Isabella as shown in list of children, next column], married George W. Davidson. The Goodspeed History of Maury County, 1887 gives the following biography of George W. Davidson:

"George W. Davidson was born in Lawrence County on June 22, 1847. He was the son of George W. and Elizabeth J. Wasson Davidson. His father was one of the founding fathers of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church at Mt. Ararat.

"George Davidson joined Company 'D' of the Ninth Tennessee Cavalry in 1862 and was a part of several major battles of the Civil War, including the Battle of Franklin. He was paroled with his unit on May 12, 1865 and returned to Lawrence County. On October 16,1868, he married Chesina Jane Alford [sic], daughter of Eley H. Alford. They had three children, George M., James W., and Elizabeth J.

George Davidson moved to Maury County and settled near Mt. Pleasant. On November 4, 1884, he was elected magistrate from the 13th District of Maury County. He is a strong Democrat and a member of the Cumberland Presbyterian Church."

Eley and his family moved to Marshall County, Tennessee and settled in the Brick Church community just over the Giles County line. His wife, Elizabeth, died on March 11, 1888 and Eley died on August 10, 1895. They are buried in the Bryant Cemetery in the Brick Church community of Marshall County, Tennessee.

The children of Eley and Elizabeth Hannah Alford

1-Chirena Isabella Alford was born on July 5, 1845 and was married to George W. Davidson who was born on June 22, 1847. They were married in Lawrence County on October 18, 1865.

2-William Herbert Alford was born on February 13, 1849. He married Maggie Johnson, born in 1855, on October 17, 1875 in Lawrence County. In the 1880 Census of Lawrence County it shows that they lived in the 15th District with his mother-in-law, Annie Johnson.

3-Nancy Ann Alford was born on April 10, 1851 and died on May 23, 1901. She married Dr. Hudson. They had one daughter, Maggie Hudson.

4-James Houston Alford was born on January 11, 1853 and died on December 12, 1924. He was married to Virginia (Jeannie) Austin. She was born on October 12, 1861 and died on December 19, 1935. Both of them are buried in the Mars Hill Cemetery in Marshall County, Tennessee. They had four children; Harris, Nannie, Charles, and Mary Alford.

5-Dr. Madden D. Alford was born on September 13, 1855 and died on November 23, 1908. He was married to Emma Belle Bryant, who was born on March 14, 1864 and died on June 9, 1931. They had two children: infant son born and died March 15, 1888; Lenice Maria Alford, born September 15, 1889, and died on December 9, 1941. She was married to Jack M. Kaiser (1915–1941). All are buried in the Bryant Cemetery in Marshall County, Tennessee.

6-Mary Alice (Molly) Alford was born on February 14, 1858 and died on July 12, 1893. She married William M. Bryant on February 14, 1881. They had two children: Ernest Alford Bryant (born December 23, 1887 and died December 12, 1975) married to Ethel Kathryn Fowler on September 12, 1912) and Nannie Belle Bryant (born April 22, 1891 and died September 2, 1979). She married Thomas Luther Martin on September 9, 1909. They are buried in the Bryant Cemetery in Marshall County, Tennessee.

7-John Robert Alford was born on October 13, 1860 and died on May 28, 1951. He was married to Livonie Paralee Doggett on December 3, 1899. She was born on April 15, 1873 and died on and died on April 25, 1954. They moved to Oklahoma City, Oklahoma in 1910 and died and are buried there. They had three children: (1) Zona Belle (September 7, 1900—February 4, 1976; (2) R.V. Alford (June 1, 1903—May 24, 1983); and (3) Christie Wilson Alford born February 28, 1906 and married Paul Franklin Baldwin on _____ 11, 1931. [AAFA NOTE: Christie is AAFA #006; she married 6 Nov 1931.]

8-Dewitt Clinton Alford: He was born on March 17, 1863 and died on June 5, 1944. He never married and is buried in Mars Hill Cemetery in the edge of Marshall County, Tennessee.

William M. Alford Mexican War

William Madison Alford was born on February 23, 1824 in Lawrence County, Tennessee. He was the youngest son of Ira Bailey and Nancy Williams Alford. William Alford joined the Lawrenceburg Blues as First Corporal in 1846 for service in the Mexican War.

He died on October 2, 1846 from wounds inflicted at the Battle of Monterrey on September 21, 1846. The story of William Madison Alford is the story of a brave group of men from Lawrence County, Tennessee who met disaster on a foreign battlefield.

The Mexican war is thought of as a prelude to the Civil War, but it was one of the most important parts of our heritage. The end of the war saw the boundaries of the United States extended to the West Coast, and was the beginning of the great country we live in today.

James Knox Polk of Columbia, Tennessee was elected President of the United States in 1844 and he knew exactly what he had to do—tariff reduction, treasury reform, settlement of the Oregon Territory and most important of all, extension of the nation's boundaries to the Pacific Ocean. Relations between the two countries had become steadily worse because of the Texas issue. Texas was annexed in 1845 and Mexico broke off relations with the United States. President Polk sent General Zackary Taylor and an army to the Texas side of the Rio Grand River in early 1846. Taylor's orders were to keep the Mexicans out of the disputed territory.

On April 24, 1846 a force of 1,600 Mexicans crossed the Rio Grande, encircled 64 Americans and killed, wounded or captured all of them. "Hostilities may now be considered to have commenced," Taylor wrote. On May 11th, President Polk's war message went to Congress; "American blood has been shed on American soil, and a state of war exists notwithstanding all of our efforts to avoid it!" The Mexican War had started!

A call for volunteers rang out the nation's youth hurried to meet the call. Tennessee furnished more volunteers than the states of New York and New Jersey combined. The war was very popular in the South and just as unpopular in the North.

In Lawrence County, feeling against the Mexicans was at a fever pitch. Most people looked upon the president as a "home town" boy. The massacre of David Crockett and the others at the Alamo in 1836 was fresh on the mind of the people and they were ready to move to Mexico.

There were two militia units in Lawrence County at the time, the Clay Guards and the Lawrenceburg Blues. They merged into one and began their march into destiny with Captain William Bethel Allen leading the way.

The Lawrenceburg Blues joined Taylor's army and began to march deeper and deeper into Mexico. On September 21, 1846 Taylor's army attacked the heavily fortified city of Monterrey. The Lawrenceburg Blues were in the forefront of the battle that

day and suffered a real disaster.

Although the battle was won by the Americans, most of the members of the Lawrence County regiment were either killed or wounded. Many of those wounded died of their wounds and are buried in Mexico

Obituary for William M. Alford

by Leonidas M. Bentley December 2, 1846

Every issue of the *Lawrenceburg Academist* reported the death of a brave son of Lawrence County. One obituary that appeared in the paper on December 2, 1846 is reprinted on this page:

We are pained to hear, by almost every mail, of some bereavement to the families of those who have friends in our gallant volunteer company. Among the latest cases, we have noticed the death of William M. Alford. This fine young man had but just entered upon the active duties of life, when he heard from the plains of the Rio Grande the harsh blasts of the war bugle calling his country to arms, and to meet a foe who had dared to pollute the soil of free men. With his hostile touch, he waited not a moment, but with his neighbors, the lamented Allens, the Lindseys and others he quickly abandoned his well used implements of peaceful agriculture, seized his armor, and rushed to battle in defense of his "Own, his native land!"

How well he performed his duty as a soldier, how gallantly he followed his heroic captain, with whom he now sleeps in a glorious soldier's grave, is attested by every officer and soldier he served with. He is taken from his friends, and they mourn; But let them know and be consoled by the reflections that he has given a hero's name to the annals of our country. He is

dead, but so long as patriotism is esteemed a virtue, and chivalry an honor, his name shall stand by the side of his noble commander, who, all admit was among the bravest, as one of the gallant young men, who in the hour of danger, heard and prompted, gladly left home and friends to suffer the privations and dare the dangers of a soldier's life.

Peace to thy ashes and eternal honor to thy memory, Alford. Though you perished young, the measure of your glory was full and the story of your patriotism shall, though you sleep in a foreign land which confine the bodies of your compatriots in arms, be repeated and echoed to all lands, in all ages, and whenever repeated, shall be honored and loved.

The Monument on the Public Square

During 1847, the people of Lawrence County erected a monument to the brave soldiers of the Lawrenceburg Blues who died so bravely at the Battle of Monterrey. This monument, paid for by volunteer contributions, is one of the two Mexican War monuments now standing in the United States.

The Monument Saves the Courthouse

During the Civil War, when Federal troops were shelling the Lawrence County Courthouse, the commander asked what the beautiful monument in front of the courthouse was. When he was told it was in the memory of soldiers who fought and died in the Mexican War, he ordered his men to cease firing. The result was that the Lawrence County Courthouse was not destroyed. It was one of the few courthouses in Middle Tennessee that was not burned during the Civil War. For this reason, records in the courthouse go all the way back to the founding of the county. �

Note from Gil Alford

Why the Family Branch Designator doesn't always match the ancestor's data

The Family Branch Designator began as an individual's reference when I began building the file almost 15 years ago. It was my way of keeping track of people in our files: the first three letters of the ancestor's first name, the last three digits of the ancestor's birth year, and the birth state—based on what was known at the time I first entered the ancestor's information into the computer. (Currently, the family branch is being designated as the person closest to 1800.)

Example: The branch designator for Virginia Alford Johnston, #811, is NAT785VA.

Once assigned, that reference is applied to all descendants and is used in many places—hard copies, different books, various computer files, etc. It is not practical—in fact it's very unwise—to go back and change the designator when updated information is received.

Example: #811's designator should be, based on current information,

Example: #811's designator should be, based on current information, NAT800KY.

While the Family Branch Designator may reflect incorrect information because it is used as a filing mechanism, the ancestor's actual data is entered into the files correctly and will be reflected everywhere but in the designator.
