For many years, the Alford Genealogical Society and other genealogists have searched for the authentic records to verify their ancestral lines. Here, now, are the records of Dr. Corrington Loyal Alford. His hours and hours of research can be a tremendous help to not only the Alford line, but to others who have searched for their family ancestral lines.

Dr. Alford's manuscripts consist of over four hundred pages of names, dates, birthplace, imarried names, children and occupations. He also has written some stories about these people and their families.

These manuscripts of Dr. Alford have been carefully handed down in our family. I have felt that his work should be published, as I feel he would have wanted it. I would have liked to publish his work in his own handwriting but it is very difficult to read. I will, however, include a copy of some of the original pages. This will be a benefit to others that seek the links to their own family history.

Dr. Alford compiled his work into ten sections in one large manuscript. He also has two reference books where he recorded the letters of the families he received information about. These two volumes I have decided to publish in the original writings, as they coincide with the main, larger manuscript. I did not verify or modify the existing research and all information is presented here as it was written in the original manuscript, the spelling and punctuation were not changed.

I would like to add that I take no credit for any of this work. I give all the credit of this research to my grandfather, Dr. Corrington Loyal Alford. I would, however, like to thank my editor, Mrs. Beverly Merritt for the many many hours she has spent typing this manuscript for me. I couldn't have done it without her, My thanks to my Aunt Gladys Drummond for letting me copy pictures from the old Alford family Bible.

I'd also like to thank my husband for enduring the many hours helping me to figure out the difficult handwriting of Dr. Corrington Loyal Alford.
