Portage County } ss On this 22<sup>nd</sup> day of Sept 1819 before  
me the Subscriber one of the Judges of the  
Court of Common Pleas for said County Person  
appeared Asahel Alford aged fifty eight years resident  
in said County who being by me first duly sworn according  
to law doth on oath on his Oath make the following  
declaration in order to obtain the provisions made by the  
late Act of Congress Entitled an act to provide for certain  
persons engaged in the land and naval Service of the United  
States in the Revolutionary War — That he the said Asahel  
Alford Enlisted for the term of three years in the Month  
of Jan'y 1777 in the State of Massachusetts in the Company  
commanded by Capt Moses Ashley of the Regiment commanded  
by Colonel <sup>Joseph</sup> Morris in the line of the State of Massachusetts  
on the Continental Establishment that he continued to serve in  
the said corps or in the service of the United States until the  
first of Jan'y 1780 when he was discharged from Service  
at the Highlands on Hudson's River in the State of New York  
that he was in the battles of taking of Burgoyne Monmouth  
and Long Island — And that he is in reduced circumstances  
and stands in need of the assistance of his country for  
support And that he has no other evidence now in his power  
of his said services —  
Sworn to and declared before me the day and year above written

I Elias Harmon Judge of, as aforesaid do certify that  
it appears to my satisfaction that the said Asahel Alford  
did serve in the revolutionary war as stated in the preceding  
declaration against the common enemy for the term of  
nine months at one time on the continental establishment  
and I now transmit the proceedings and testimony taken  
and had before me to the Secretary for the Department of  
War pursuant to the directions of the aforesaid Act of  
Congress — I am also satisfied that he needs the assistance  
of his country for support — I certify that the previous  
declaration was dated the 22<sup>nd</sup> Sept 1819, —

State of New York  
Herkimer County ss on this fifth day of May 1822 in open  
court, to wit, the court of Common Pleas in and  
for said County, said court being by law constituted a court  
of Record, personally appeared, as aforesaid, aged sixty  
one years, resident in the town of Columbia, in said County  
who being first duly sworn according to Law, doth on his  
oath declare, that he served in the revolutionary war as  
follows - that <sup>he enlisted</sup> at Bickett, Mass, for three years, as a private  
in Captain Moses Ashleys Company, in Colonel Tades Re-  
giment of Infantry, in Gen. Glovers Brigade in the  
Massachusetts Line, on the continental establishment - that  
he served in said company and Regiment for three years  
until he was honorably discharged from the same, at the  
Highlands, in the state of New York, in the month of  
January 1779 - as the deponent believes; that his original  
declaration was made in September, 1819, but that he  
is unable to state the number of his pension certificate,  
which certificate has been lost, as he is informed, and  
believes to be true -

And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident  
citizen of the United States, on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March  
1818; and that I have not since that time, by gift, sale, or  
in any manner, disposed of my property, or any part thereof  
with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within  
the provisions of an act of Congress, entitled "an act to  
provide for certain persons engaged in the Land and naval  
services of the United States, in the Revolutionary War"  
passed on the 18<sup>th</sup> day of March 1818; and that I have  
not, nor has any person in trust for me, any property,  
(my necessary clothing and bedding excepted) as

Securities, contracts, or debts due to me, nor have I  
any income, other than what is contained in the  
Schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Asahel Alford, a pensioner of Columbia, Herkimer County, New York, in 1840.

The data which follow are found in the papers on file in pension claim, S. 45184, based upon service of Asahel Alford in the Revolutionary War.

Asahel Alford enlisted in Boxford, Massachusetts, January 1, 1776, served as private in Captain Moses Ashley's company, Colonel John Paterson's Massachusetts regiment, was at the Cedarton on the St. Lawrence River where he was taken prisoner, was held about ten days and exchanged; he enlisted January 1, 1777 and served three years as private in Captain Moses Ashley's company, Colonel Joseph Vose's Massachusetts regiment and was discharged at the Highlands, New York State. During his service, he was in the battle when General Burgoyne was taken, in the battle of Long Island, and also at Monmouth.

Asahel Alford was allowed pension on his application executed September 22, 1819, at which time he resided in Sharon, Portage County, Ohio; he gave his age then as fifty-eight years, but did not state the date and place of his birth, nor the names of his parents.

In May 1822, the soldier had moved from Ohio to Columbia, Herkimer County, New York. His family at that time consisted of his wife, Lydia, aged sixty-two years, and a daughter, Malinda, aged about thirty years; the maiden name of the soldier's wife, the date and place of their marriage, and names of any other children are not shown. This pensioner died June 25, 1855; one Alonso Ellwood was referred to as administrator of the soldier's estate in 1855.

In 1819, Elijah Alford was a resident of Sharon, Portage County.

Ohio; he stated that he was intimately acquainted with Archel Alford from his youth and was a near neighbor, but he did not state any relationship between them.
