

A visit to an English Village and a Norman Castle named "Alford."

In this issue, the Charles H. Alfords of Palm Harbor, Florida (AAFA #0187 ISH7649NC) tell of their trip in July 1998 to the ancestral "home" of many American Alfords. After a two-week "home exchange" in London, they continued their travels across Great Britain. Foremost in their plans was a two-night stopover at Chester. They needed one full day to visit the ruinsof two ancient medieval Norman castles where the family name of Alford is believed to have originated. One is Aldford Village, where the only remains of the Castle de Aldford are the earthworks of the castle motte and bailey system.

The second group of ruins is that of the Castle of Holt at the Town of Holt, where the ruins still remain, but in an advanced state of decay.
